INTERESTING STATE NEWS

STARTLING REVELATIONS

Ashtand, Ky.—Startling revelations into the management of the Eastern Kentucky Asylum for the Insane at Lexington, Ky. are promulgated by the death of a friend of Fred Ketterer, who died at the institution in June. It is alleged that certain employees of the institution will be charged with murder. Ketterer was a resident of this city and had for years employed at the institution here. During the latter part of May he became violent and at his friends in the street later said it was necessary for him to be caught and for while being taken to the asylum it was less than a month after being taken to the asylum Ketterer's remains were sent to his family in his city, with the information from the asylum officials that he had come to his death as a result of "exhaustion due to acute insanity." This verdict was not approved by the family of Ketterer, especially after his remains arrived here, and marks of violence were visible on his face, and a post-mortem examination was held which disclosed the fact that the man had apparently suffered blows on the back of the head in various parts of his body, which local physicians claim were sufficient to cause his death.

DEATH IN ITS WAKE

Shower of Timbers and Iron Followed the Bursting of a Boiler.

Mt. Sterling, Ky.—A terrific explosion occurred at Marilla, Menfess county, when the boiler of the railway water tank burst up. The boiler was torn to pieces, and Ross Byrd and John Hale were instantly killed, their bodies being badly mangled by falling timbers and pieces of iron. Miss Dices Wilson was fatally burned, and James Haseg and Mrs. Waters, wife of the owner, and her child were so badly burned and scalded that they will probably die, even should they recover. The boiler was blown hundreds of feet away. The loss on the tank will be about \$2,000. This is the third explosion which has occurred in this place within the past year from boiler.

JUDGE LASSING'S PLACE

On the Democratic Committee to Be Given to Haldeman.

Louisville, Ky.—Following the resignation of Judge J. H. Lassing as a member of the democratic state central committee, the executive committee of the party has been organized. A list of names has been given but that Col. W. B. Haldeman would be elected to fill the vacancy. It is thought that Chairman Lewis McQuown will be given a seat for a few days, but will be formally given the post. It is also believed that the name of Louis Haldeman, brother of the one who has been an active canvasser for the position, will be presented to the committee, as Mr. Haldeman has more than enough votes to carry him through.

The snake was shot and cleared away. Just before he was killed Hagan received a threatening letter from the brother-in-law, who was Frank. Franklin has been arrested and charged with the murder. The fact that he has written the letter is the striking similarity of his handwriting to that of the party who wrote the threatening letter. After being held to the grand jury Franklin admitted writing his brother-in-law's letter, "just for fun."

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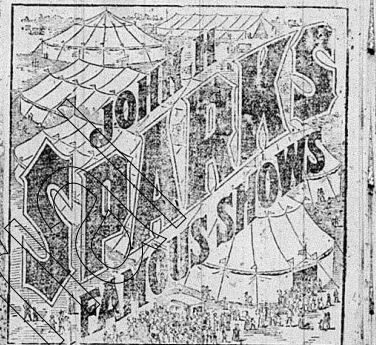
