The railroad company having given their consent to the building of the crossing connecting Taylor Grove with the main Mt. 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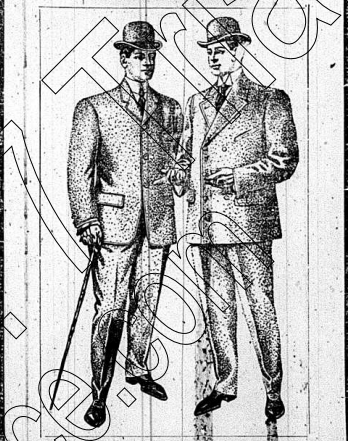

RENT PAYS FOR THE LAND.

FERTILE SECTIONS OF THE SOUTHWEST WHERE LAND SELLS FOR \$15 AND RENTS FOR \$5 PER ACRE.
