RIVER AND CREEK STREAMS. YOUNG MOTHER.

Accused of Murder, Collapsed When Murderer Marched to His Death. Lexington, Ky.—As pathetic as was the execution of Thomas Stout in the yard of the county here, there was a scene enacted on the third floor of the jail building that brought tears to the eyes of even the spectators who were and his deputies. As the death march began from Stout's cell to the gallows the wails of a young woman were heard by the officers, and a halt was made for a moment to ascertain the origin of the wails. They were the sobs of Mrs. Ella Griffith, wife of the slain man, herself under indictment for the murder of her 15-month-old child. Mrs. Griffith occupied a cell on the third floor, directly overlooking the jail yard, and since the workmen began the erection of the scaffold on which Stout was to meet his doom Mrs. Griffith has been in a state of almost total collapse. As Stout and the guards passed from her cell to the gallows Mrs. Griffith was removed to the cell vacated by the doomed man in order that she would not see nor hear the drop. Mrs. Griffith was arrested on a warrant issued out by her husband's mother, charged with murder, and the recent grand jury found a bill against her. Stout was executed for the murder of his 15-month-old child, committed several months ago.

HOW TO KNOW AND RAISE IT.

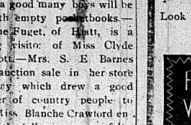

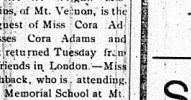

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VERY LITTLE CHANGE IN THE CATTLE MARKET AT CHICAGO, ACCORDING TO RHOSS

Cattle trade shows very little change says the H. Beecher's Gazette.

Considerable number of head of about dull markets but when the volume of supply is taken into consideration it is a very satisfactory market.

Choice heaves and making \$7.25 to \$1 per cow.

Light than a year ago although that feature of the trade is of small consequence.

A year ago, however, \$6.25 to one cent steers and the bulk moved at a range of \$4.00 to \$5.75.

The weapon hanging by a thread over the market is an immediate necessity of warm-weather steers that promises to crush values by sheer weight and a fear exists that these will be marked injudiciously as everybody, or nearly so, is afraid of running off a feet bill.

The market is of \$4.50 to \$5.00 for the bulk of cattle, and this is more to be expected than advance as the primary season is at hand and holders are disposed to ship steers carrying quality before they are in condition to produce heavy work.

Always in this season, the market is active and fluctuations are wide, especially in mid-winter cattle. Buyers are calling for quality and anything fit to sell above \$6 moves over the scale with alacrity.

Business is being done above \$7, and the necessary material is being had, but at \$6.25 there is good volume of trade and shippers are in the market to take all the \$6.25 cattle they can find.

Exporters are paying \$1.20 to \$1.30 for their good cattle and getting the usual market for the rest.

Liverpool accounts. British markets came a shade lower this week, Liverpool quoting the best American cattle at 12 1/2 cents for previous and 1/4 to 1/2 a year ago the decline being due to a heavy supply of Canadian and domestic steers.
