MINOR F. FISH

Beneath the azure skies of the southern State of North Carolina on Wednesday December 26, 1906, the life of Minor Fleetwood Fish was peacefully ended. An invalid for almost two years, Mr. Fish, after spending some time in the West, had gone to Asheville for his health; but that great boon was denied him, for he began failing rapidly from the time of his arrival. Born at Fountain Head, Tenn., in the year 1853, in the month of November and on the 18th day, the second child of the wife of the late H. M. Fish, the younger of two boys and the older brother of a loving sister. His mother, Mrs. R. B. Mullins, and sister, Miss Marguerite Fish, of this place, and brother, John H. Fish, of Marietta, Ga., survive him, his father having been dead for about nine years. The body, on last Saturday, was laid for its eternal sleep by the side of his father, in the family lot at Fountain Head, Tenn., the town of his birth.

Most unfortunate, indeed, and pitiful seems his death, coming as it did in the prime of life, when he had only begun to unfold its great opportunities and possibilities. An early age Mr. Fish began the study of telegraphy, being a most apt pupil, he soon entered the service of the L. & N. R. Co., as operator, and advancing rapidly to the rank of train dispatcher, becoming one of the most efficient as well as being the youngest on the line. Here he served for quite a time, and afterwards, due to the fact of his poor health, going west only to find that he must return, unimproved. Remaining here for about six months, his health still failing, he went, on December 17, to Asheville, N. C., where on Wednesday last, week, he met his death with perfect composure.
