In view of recent injury nobody can tell what it will open next; but it is probable that there will be more actively disposing of hogs next at the same rate and this may be followed by another decline.

One dollar per bushel is the price fixed as equitable and fair and no one can deny that this is a reasonable price. With wheat at six cent, hogs, six cent, lamb, six cent, cattle and sheep, and corn, the farmer will be coming into something like his own—Danville Advocate.

He has been visiting relatives to St. Louis for several weeks and has just returned to Tennessee. Bundren and Miss McGuire were sweethearts in Tenn. in her youth. Her parents, of English descent, would not consent to the marriage, and finally returned to England taking their daughter with them. Bundren went to California and acquired considerable wealth. He later married. From California he returned to Tennessee and bought his birthplace near Tatesville. He decided to hold a reunion of old friends on his estate this year and sent numerous invitations. Not long ago he received a letter from Miss McGuire. Correspondence followed and he renewed his offer of marriage and was accepted. The date of the wedding and the reunion of friends has been set for August 26 on the bride's birthday anniversary when she will be 103 years old. Bundren has long, white hair and a flowing white beard. In June he will go to Preston, La. to see his English, to accept his intended bride to his Tennessee estate. John B. Bundren, of St. Louis, a namesake, will be best man.

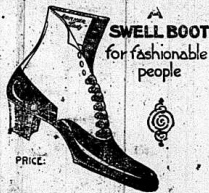
