GETS 7,500.

In the case of Evan's Administrator against the C. N. O. & T. P. In spite of the majority of 422 against prohibition in Owensboro, there is a question as to whether the city went "wet" or "dry" in Saturday's local option election. It was generally understood and specially stated by some of the numbers that the prohibition people will make an attempt to have the Courts hold that the licensing of saloons in Owensboro is prohibited by the result of the election in the county as a whole. The county as a whole went "dry" by over 1,500 votes. The contention will be based primarily, on a single sentence of the county unit law, or, rather on the ambiguous nature of this amendmentary act of the Legislature of 1906. When an election is held in an entire county and a majority of the legal votes cast at said election are against the sale of intoxicating liquors, then it shall not be lawful to sell, barter or loan such liquors in any portion of the county. The temperance people of Owensboro held a meeting Sunday afternoon. One merchant said: "This morning there was a crane on my door. Thirty years ago today there was a crane on my father's floor. James Buchanan, the oldest, died at the age of seventy-seven. Millard Fillmore was seventy-four at the time of his death and Rutherford B. Hayes passed away soon after he had reached his seventieth birthday.

The American Society of Equity

On April 1st began a six-month campaign to make the price of wheat one dollar per bushel. The battlefield is in the States of North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota, Nebraska, Kansas and Oklahoma. In those States of the total crop of 1906, 248,610,000 bushels were shipped out of the countries where the wheat was grown. Of the wheat grown in other States 185,390,000 bushels were shipped out of the countries where it was grown. It is proposed to get fifty per cent of this wheat that is ordinary sold, pledged to the American Society of Equity by the 1st day of October. This fight will be watched with interest by wheat growers throughout the country.

POLITICS AND POLITICIANS

Col. William Youngblood, of Alabam, in an interview declares that Southern Republicans are far from being a unit for Taft, and may not support the presidential choice at the national convention.

Congressman Theodore E. Burton, of Ohio, in an address in Trenton, N. J., Friday night eulogized the administration of President Roosevelt and declared himself for Secretary Taft for President in 1908.

Congressman Ollie James has given out the following interview: "I have never wavered in my belief that William J. Bryan would be the next nominee of the Democratic party. He will be chosen by acclamation. I am strongly of the opinion that he will be chosen. No one only has a greater hold on the masses than ever, but he will get thousands of Republican and Independent votes. The policies of Roosevelt which appeals so forcibly to the voters today have all along been advocated by Bryan in the foremost statements of the day. He is honest and unselfish and his countrymen believe in him."

The jury which has been trying Bill Britton, on a charge of complicity in the murder of James Cockrill was unable to agree at Lexington and was finally discharged. It stood 3 for acquittal, 4 for conviction, and was never close to an agreement, all the jurors maintaining the same opinion from the time they first took the case.

NEWS ITEMS

Simultaneous fires in the towns of Leesville and Rosepine, La., Tuesday caused damage estimated at more than \$200,000.

Another suit has been filed against the Standard Oil Company at Findlay, seeking to oust the corporation from the State of Ohio.

Many people joined in the celebration at Morganfield Tuesday that marked the completion of the new railroad connecting with the L. & N.

Plans are being perfected to make a memorable occasion of the visit of the Mayor and businessmen of Louisville to Coryton, Ind., on May 7.

A Mexican paper says the Guzman family exiles in that country are preparing to organize a provisional government in the City of Mexico, believing that another revolution is imminent and will be successful.

Coincident with the report that John W. Gates and his son, Chas. G. Gates will withdraw from active participation in the stock market comes the report that the firm was recently heavily involved and that the losses of father and son in the last year aggregated \$40,000,000.

Four arrests have been made at the instance of District Attorney Jerome, of New York, as a result of his investigation of the recent election in the big New York insurance companies. Among those apprehended is George R. Scroggins, manager of the International Policy holders' Committee.

The Court of Appeals Monday reversed the judgement of the Kenton Circuit Court in a case of A. J. Sheehan against the Louisville and Nashville Railroad Company in which was presented the question of whether a common carrier may carry liquors into local option territory after the passage of the act of 1906 prohibiting it. The court holds that the new act is not designed to prohibit the carrier delivering liquor in a local option district to a person not prohibited from selling it because of his license, secured beforehand, not having expired.

Gold beaten out into a leaf 200,000 of an inch in thickness becomes a silencer, and the light by penetrating it gives it a greenish hue.

For poultry on a dog and setting it on fire, a Lexington woman was presented in Police Court and given the maximum fine by the presiding judge. She pleaded for leniency on the ground that the act was done in the heat of anger, but the court said no mercy could be extended in a case of such brutality.

Questions involving the future of the Butley tobacco organization known as the Society of Equity, in Kentucky, were presented to the Court of Appeals Monday in an action brought before the court from Woodford county. The American Tobacco Co. and individual engaged in raising tobacco have asked the court to dissolve an injunction secured in the Woodford Circuit Court re-training these individuals from selling their tobacco to the plaintiff after they have pledged to the Butley organization.
