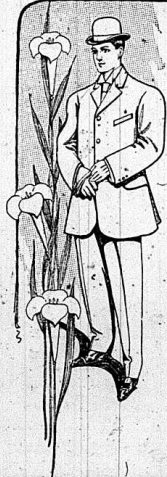

### LAND, STOCK AND CROP

On account of the wheat market taking a sudden upward turn, flour on the local market has fallen into line and advanced also Anderson & Spittman, the local Millers, report an advance of 20 cents per cwt. and 40 cents per barrel on best patent. This will make the price at the local stores jump a little. The article has been selling at \$2.50 per cwt, but will be advanced to \$2.70 and \$5.40 per barrel. Barley went to 82 cents at Chicago this week, the highest known in twenty years. The report of the great damages being done throughout the country by the green bug is claimed to be responsible for the sudden turn.

Early prices on spring lambs in Kentucky and Tennessee have been changed to a higher basis, according to late reports. For June and July picking it is now a 7 cent trade. Speculators are reported to be paying the price freely. It looks safe for June but is dangerous for July. Early contracts were made at 6-4 1/2 to 1 cent and those who got in on that basis are treading on velvet. In Virginia, also, contracts are being made at 7 cents. May picking will be soot as grass has been backward and growers are anxious to hold the stuff back to make it good. June will see the movement in full swing and it will be the heaviest since Kentucky and Tennessee became interested in lamb breeding. These lambs will fill a gap between fed and western grass stuff and avert a famine. A year ago contracts were being made on a 6-cent basis and current high prices will doubtless have a stimulating influence on lamb production in the country south of Ohio and east of the Mississippi river.
