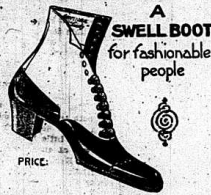

EVEN ON BOAT

LOST IN HAMPTON ROADS—GRAPT VANISHES.

BETWEEN SHORE AND BATTLESHIP.

It Regarded as the Greatest Disaster to the Navy Personnel Since the Spanish War.

Washington, June 12.—The loss of one time of six bright young midshipmen fresh from the academy at Annapolis and a boatswain and four enlisted men attached to the battleship Minnesota—seven men altogether as reported briefly to the navy department—was one of the most severe blows that has fallen upon the personnel of the navy since the Spanish war, in the estimation of the officials.

The first news of the calamity reached the department through dispatches from Norfolk.

Acting Secretary Newberry and Adm. Brownson, chief of the navigation bureau, and the seasoned naval officers who made up the staff, hoped that there had been a mistake because they had received no word from Adm. Evans, commander-in-chief of the Atlantic fleet, who was present in Hampton roads.

A wireless message was dispatched from the station at the Washington navy yard, directed to the fleet lying in the roads, inquiring into the accuracy of the report. Within a half-hour the following answer came from Adm. Evans, dissipating the last hope that had been cherishing.

"A dirty box belonging to Mrman of the Minnesota's missing launch has been picked up about near North 37, and I am forced to conclude that the launch, with all on board, are lost."

Have ordered board of investigation. Steamer last seen at Exposition Pier about midnight Monday.

In the opinion of the officials of the department Adm. Evans had delayed sending this message until he had exhausted every means of finding a trace of the missing men.

The sailors at the navy department said that there was always a chance that the launch had merely broken down her machinery, and going adrift without center in the very straits which that swept through the roads, had perhaps gone out to sea with her crew and passengers still alive.

There was also the chance that, having been run down by some big vessel, the crew had been taken aboard while the launch had gone down.

Norfolk, Va., June 12.—It was stated authoritatively here that the naval officers in Hampton roads, who had the identity of a steamer which was fired upon the launch—the battleship Minnesota in Hampton roads, and the arrest of the crew of the steamer is expected to follow.

PORT OF SALVADORE SEIZED. War in Central America Has Been Renewed.

Mexico City, June 12.—Hostilities have broken out in Central America since the capture of the port of Acajutla, Salvador. The capture of Acajutla, Salvador, has the shape of a telegram from President Huerta to the Salvadoran minister in Mexico, Minister Delgado.

The Nicaraguans on board the gunboat Monoceros bombarded the fort and then landed troops on the beach now in the hands of the Nicaraguans. Gen. Manuel Rivera, intense excitement.

It is believed the objective point of the expedition is the port of San Jose, Guatemala, and that President de la Jara, of Nicaragua, has declared war against Guatemala.

Second Storm Wrecks Duquenois. Battles, Ill., June 12.—The second of a series of five cyclones predicted for Southern Illinois swept over this city and the surrounding community. The wind was comparatively light in duration, the damage inflicted was not so heavy as that of Friday.

Shot Him Twice in Breast. Richmond, Va., June 12.—William Mitchell shot himself twice in the breast in his home here after a fight of despondency, spent in public houses and on the streets. He is a hospital patient here, and his wife, who has been his nurse for several weeks ago when duquenois was in his home here, after his wife has refused to see him since his failure to appear at the altar, she and many friends were waiting.

Boiler Blew Up. Brent, June 12.—A steamer whose boiler has not been conclusively established went ashore to the Strait of Beersheba. The boiler blew up, and it is feared all hands were lost. The steamer is believed to be the Yez, a freightboat from Plymouth to Brent.

Philadelphia, Pa., June 12.—Eleven men were injured, two of them seriously, by the falling of an elevator in the Hotel Marlborough. The elevator was being lowered to the ground by the Government by sending in false reports regarding conditions in San Francisco.

ADRIFF FOURTEEN DAYS IN DOORY.

STARVING FISHERMAN RESCUED AFTER TERRIBLE SUFFERING.

His Mate Was Drowned When Both Men Were Washed Overboard By a Heavy Sea.

New York, June 12.—One of those ocean waifs who, at frequent intervals, are lost in their doory while fishing on the Grand Banks off Newfoundland, was brought into this port by the Custom House Carmanna, still suffering from 14 days of starvation, exposure and hardship while adrift on the Atlantic. He was Louis Vollet, one of the crew of the three-masted French fishing schooner Mimosa, from St. Malo, France. His doory mate was drowned when both men were washed overboard by a heavy sea which almost overturned the little boat.

The Mimosa was at anchor on the edge of the Grand Bank, when Vollet and his mate left the schooner on the morning of May 27 to take the fish from his trawl, which was stretched deep for several miles from the ship.

Before they could return a storm came on, accompanied by dense fog. The fishermen could make no headway against it, and the doory was blown far away. A heavy sea broke aboard and washed the two men overboard. Vollet crumpled back, but his mate disappeared.

For six days Vollet subsisted on the sea, with which he was unable to cope. He was exhausted and drank the rain water which fell to the boat, but the seventh day the fog was exhausted and Vollet died of starvation. Although Vollet was in the pathway of the ocean liners, he had drifted south of it, and had not been sighted in the course of the day by a passing vessel. He kept track of the passage of the day by cutting a high in the cupwale of the doory rock night.

When the lookout of the Carmanna sighted the craft on Monday last, 14 days after Vollet left the Mimosa, he went feverily trying to pull his doory up to light off the steamer. Capt. Warr brought the Carmanna to, and Vollet was lifted on board. He was placed in the ship's hospital and a concert was given, at which a substantial subscription was taken for his benefit. He will return to France as soon as he is able.

CONSCIENCE TROUBLED HIM. Murderer, After 35 Years, Voluntarily Returned to Prison.

Arling, Tex., June 12.—John K. Altam who has lived more than a quarter of a century near Hot Springs, Ark., where he is a prominent member of the community, was granted a full pardon by Gov. Campbell for a murder committed in Texas 25 years ago.

Altam was 18 years old when he first went into a passenger train near Fort Worth, killing a man named J. Schuch. He was tried, convicted and sentenced to a life imprisonment in the State penitentiary. He escaped after serving 10 months. He went to the home of relatives near Hot Springs, Ark., where he lived unapprehended during all these years. He married and raised a family of children.

During all this time he says that his conscience troubled him and of late years decided to obtain peace of mind by confessing to and voluntarily surrendering to Gov. Campbell, which he did a week ago.

Friends rallied to his aid and a petition for his pardon was submitted to the governor. The petition was favorably acted upon.

Greenwood, Ark., June 12.—Gov. John R. Little is again near to death. He has taken no nourishment for three days, and the loss of vitality is noticeable. His physicians hope he is no longer entertained for recovery.
