The improvement was of short duration. The body which had been so strong and active for more than 50 years, had lost its strength and could no longer endure the heavy strain. Two weeks ago he took his bed, gradually growing worse until Tuesday night of last week when he passed into a state of unconsciousness from which he never rallied.
 It is felt one could claim a greater number of friends than he, and no one was ever better than he, a friend. For nearly twenty-one years he has served continuously as Clerk of the county court and the handsome majorities which he has won are evidence of his popularity.
 Besides his good wife, he leaves six children, four boys, Mace, Oper, and William, Carl, John, and L. N. conductor, Scott and Ray, younger boys who are with their mother, and two daughters, Miss Georgia, the blind daughter, and Miss Besie. Besides these, he had the McCoy grand-children, which he had always cared for, since their mother's death, till the same as his own.

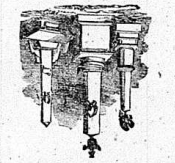

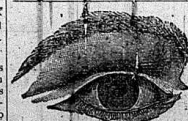

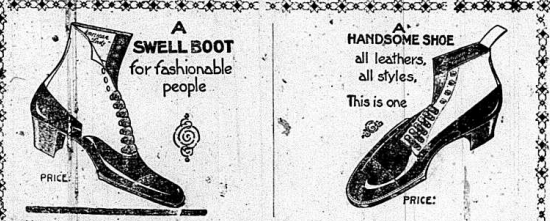

On account of agitation everywhere for a reduction of rates, it is said that little construction of railroad lines has been going on this summer. In Kentucky a railroad man said Tuesday afternoon, no tracks for new lines have been laid all season, with the exception of little side coal lines and other lines connecting manufacturing sites to the main line of the road. This is the first summer in years, it is declared, that the railroads have manifested such hesitation in the construction of new lines. When asked for the cause of this condition, a railroad man said: "The railroads are getting 'heary' about this reduction in rates. Down South a reduction in rates has been enforced in a few States, and with the rate as low as it has been fixed the railroads find that they are unable to give the best service and make a reasonable profit. Some sections of the country are settled so thinly that the railroads can run only a few trains a day and then make only a fair profit."

John E. Schwler, convicted of the murder of Manning Riley, of Fleming, N. J., has been sentenced to hang on Aug. 30. He will probably be the last person to hang in the State, as under the new law, condemned persons hereafter are to be electrocuted.

Michele Barardinelle, of New York, is chief agent of the Department of Justice, commissioned by Alvaro, general Bonaparte to investigate stories of Italian peonage, is making an investigation in St. Louis.
