Engagements which are not in writing and signed by the principals and two witnesses will not be recognized by the church when one of the parties desires to marry another, but where written, agreements have been made either party can hold the other to it, and prevent him or her from marrying another. The written agreement provision of the law is advisory and directory rather than mandatory.

DANCING.
Does the Bible, either in the Old or New Testament condemn dancing? We answer, that neither the Old nor New Testament condemns dancing in any more than gambling, the most flagrant of vices according to the confession of quibblers themselves, racing, theatrical amusements, etc. plays, and other vain and idle recreations. Suppose then, there is no explicit law against any of these things? Are they "expedient"? If they be not expedient it is manifestly the solemn and imperative duty of all religious people to refrain from them. Here, then we have the ground of objection to the practice of modern dancing; it is unbecoming, imprudent, dissipated and contrary to the New Testament. It is not dancing sanctioned by the examples as well as precepts of good men, recorded in the Old Testament? This question naturally leads us to examine Exodus 15:20. And Miriam and the prophetess, the sister of Aaron, took a timbrel in her hand, and all the women went out after her with timbrels and with dances. On this passage several facts are to be noted to show that it affords no example for us to follow, and no countenance nor encouragement to modern dancing, with which many would confound all dancing in every period of the world's history. First, then, religious dancing was practiced from the remotest times; and this was a part of those religious solemnities which she was appointed to conduct among the people as joint leaders of the women with her two brothers. As God said, I brought thee (Israel) up out of the land of Egypt, and set before thee Moses, Aaron and Miriam. Micah 6:4. Of course this instance of religious dancing separate and from the men. Whose devotions were conducted by Moses and Aaron. Affords no example nor encouragement for mixed dancing. It was the principal business of certain women to celebrate victories in singing dancing etc. See 1st Samuel, 18:6-7 and Judges 11:34. One other example of dancing found in the Old Testament I must consider in this communication, the one to which I now refer is found in 2d Samuel 6:14 and is that of David, who danced before the Lord. The circumstances connected with this act of dancing is the part of David determining the moral character to be different altogether from modern dancing. It was done before the Lord "under a sense of his mighty presence, and in reference to his high glory. It was an act of worship usual in his day. It would be absurd to regard it in any other light. Not a foolish or madman would dare to do so. David went on singing and shouting, leaping and bounding more like a man in an ecstasy of triumph than according to the fashion of a modern dancer and dancer. We now give attention to the New Testament. By examining the Old Testament we find as before stated, that dancing was practiced in divine worship and in the celebration of victories. On such occasions, we have not the slightest reason to believe it was wrong. I feel quite sure that no intelligent and candid man will apply this passage. "There is a time to weep and a time to dance." Ecc. 3:4 to the modern dance, at least after reading the context; if he were to construe it literally and class figurative expression of the opposite of mourning, in which latter sense he ought to construe and apply it. To construe it literally would involve an injustice to kill, as it is written in the following verse, "A time to weep." Of the two cases of dancing in the New Testament? I mention first the one connected with the return of the prodigal son. This is a parable only, and illustrates God's willingness to receive sinners etc. The other case is found in Matt. 14:13. Herod's birthday was celebrated and Herodias's daughter danced. John the Baptist told Herod it was not lawful for him to have his brother's wife. This excited her malice against the faithful minister; to gratify which, she devised a stratagem in which her daughter very promptly participated. Being before misdirected by her mother, she leaped, danced in the midst of the festive company. No doubt she did her best and prettily. When the sundered head of a godly man was the prize of her material bidding. It must have been a very bad company to have been pleased enough to

dancing that it could should pay for dancing the bloody head of a good man. What a splendid and sensible present for a life of refined sensibility and virtuous modesty. Was there anything just or lively or pure or virtuous or wise worthy in that kind of an entertainment rewarded by murder? This is the standing argument against it to the end of time. An argument as durable as the pillars of Heaven. An argument as impressive as the voice of God sounding from the vaulted ceiling of the visible firmament, and as clear and loud in the ear of wisdom as the stinging roar of sevenfold thunder. A positive prohibition of some general's a by name, includes a direct and explicit denunciation of all the specific included or implied in that general name. See an explicit and direct denunciation of we have in the New Testament against dancing under the general name of revellings and riotings. These revellings are called the work of the flesh, Gal. 5:19. They that do such things cannot inherit the kingdom of God Gal. 5:21.

Once while walking along the streets of my own town just behind three or four young men I heard one say to the other, "What do you think of that girl being a teacher in Sunday school and taking the Lord's supper? Another said, "Why?" The first responded "I saw her dancing the other night." Another said "She is a poor Christian." Paul said "Let not then your good be evil spoken of." 1st Cor. 6:7. Again Paul said "Whatsoever you do, do all to the glory of God." 1st Cor. 10:31. 1st Cor. 3:17. Read Gal. 5:17. Kind reader, are a dancer? Are you a member of the church? Do you obey the above divine injunctions which you are engaged in the modern dance? I have my first dancing instruction to see who is of any value to the church. I sincerely have an influence for good over the hearts and lives of our jrs. Asking the question "Is it wrong to dance?" reveals the fact you have doubts about it, wisdom then says, let it alone. You never ask if it is wrong to pray, why? because you have no doubts the matter is so earnest, true Christians would not indulge in that about expediency of which we have a doubt. The Apo. the 1st says "I am an example of the believers." Again he says "show thyself a patron of good works." Men a women of God refrain from the things that will cripple your power to do good. The poor sinner is watching your conduct, make up and go to heaven take every one with you that you can. Do you not want to look in the faces of those whose beliefs have been made happy, and whose lives have been made useful through your instrumentality when the judgement day comes? Then obey God.
