A thought, gentlemen, a thought comes to me like a zephyr of a spring morning and carries with it the hope and inspiration of the beautiful For a long, long time I have contemplated making a suggestion in regard to beautifying the town so dear to the hearts of us all. There is a little triangular piece of ground belonging to the Louisville & Nashville Railroad Company, fronting and abutting on Main and Richmond Streets, and directly opposite the hotel and railroad station, on which is now located what is known as the "Old Section House". What a beautiful park it would make; The tendency of the Company has been to improve the looks of the road. At Crab Orchard, the Company has a nice park close to the station, and at several other stations along its right of way. We believe if the people of Mt. Vernon would take up the question in earnest, the Company would tear down the old section house and make a park where it now stands. It is worth trying. We move that the Board of Trustees pass a resolution asking the Company to convert this small piece into a park and that the business men of Mt. Vernon who pay hundreds of dollars every year to this Company for freight and express, get up a petition containing a similar request. If the Company refuses, then let the Trustees propose if the Company would tearish the ground Mt. Vernon, as a municipal corporation would build the park and attend to it when made. The cost would be little, but whatever it costs, let us have it. If we would prosper, let us have it. If we would be happy, and desire a more beautiful village, let us have it. It is a golden opportunity to improve and beautify. Let us shake ourselves in our downy beds and say: "Awake, get up! It is morning!"

"Rosy morn stands tiptoe on the misty mountain top." It would be so enjoyable to inhabitants of Mt. Vernon; so refreshing to its people and those who pass through upon the train. Nothing would beautify and adorn the town so much. The spirit of improvement seems to be upon us. It has been a long, long time in coming but it seems to be really here. The following editorial we clip from the Louisville Evening Post of March 27:

"In the Mt. Vernon Signal, of March 17, in an attack upon the course of Governor Beckham, we had the following frank avowal of a fact heretofore denied, that the Governor incurred party opposition because he refused after decision of the Court of Appeals to permit the continued local Malfeasance to dictate to him the men he should put in the vacant offices:

Do the Democrats of Kentucky approve the acts of this man when he was given unusual power, by reason of the office he held, to appoint the officers of the city of Louisville and Jefferson county, when he appointed men, not the choice of the constituted party authority in that city and county, or men endorsed or approved by the rank and file of the party in that city and county, but men who were opposed and objected to by both these elements of the party, but on the other hand he contended with, and followed the wishes of the most bitter enemies of the Democratic party in that good city.

That is a question the Evening Post would like to have the Democrats of Kentucky answer at the coming State convention. The facts are before the people. The record is in the decision of the Court of Appeals. That body has condemned the election of 1905 as the greatest outrage conceivable upon popular rights. It was a long saturnalia of fraud and violence. New schemes for debauching the ballot were approved by the Democratic managers of that election and condemned by the Court of Appeals.

When the Governor came to fill the vacancies he was confronted by a demand from the Machine leaders and their supporters in Louisville that he "vindicate" the deposed officeholders by reappointing them or by permitting them to name their temporary successors.

Such a demand meant, if acceded to, a repetition in 1907 of the crimes of 1905, with a probable giving over of the city to riot and bloodshed. The patience of the people of Louisville had been exhausted. They had surrendered the last foot of ground. To maintain the peace they had submitted to personal assault and numerous outrages against the ballot committee by a combination between a corrupt police force and the saloon elements in this city. They had seen the best citizens brutally beaten at the polls by uniformed policemen. They had seen men in office carrying away ballot boxes and filling them alphabetically with fraudulent votes. They had made their last appeal to the courts. Failing there, there was but one appeal, and that was an appeal to arms for the protection of the ballot box.

Fortunately for the Democratic party and for the city of Louisville, Governor Beckham ignored the demands such as the Signal approves. He put only Democrats on guard, and the Democrats were men who had

sense of responsibility for their public actions. They gave to the city of Louisville what it had not had for many years—a perfectly fair election. At that election all men were free to vote. The fraudulent Democratic majority of two years before was reversed and instead of the Democratic candidate receiving 5,000 majority the Republican candidate for Mayor was elected by 5,000 majority.

Does the Democratic party approve this course, or will it condemn Governor Beckham for taking this course? Will the Democratic convention declare that the Governor ought to have consulted "the constituted authorities" in the city and county, who had thoroughly discredited the party and humiliated the State and that he should have treated with contempt the declaration of the Court of Appeals? If that is the Democratic doctrine, it is the policy for which the Democrats of the State stand, it cannot be declared too soon or too emphatically.

On the contrary, if the Democrats of the State stand by the Governor, they ought to make that plain, not only in the platform, but in all their plans for the reorganization of the Democratic party of Kentucky."

The Post stands and has stood for many years the avowed enemy of the Democratic party and today is carrying at the head of its editorial column the name of William H. Taft, for President in 1908.

By what authority does the Post call upon the Democracy of Kentucky, at the coming State convention to say whether Mr. Beckham was right or wrong? By what right does the Post make any demands of Democrats?

The unpopularity of Beckham among Democrats in many sections of the State may be attributed—to a great extent—to the fact that the Post has been used by him as his mouth piece and its editor one of his chief advisers. When the success of the Democratic party was at stake; when a wise and conservative adjustment of affairs in Louisville was paramount, whom did Beckham repeatedly call in consultation with him? Was it the constituted party authorities? No, not so. Richard W. Knott, John W. Whalen and the Marshalls, the latter the head of the Republican party in Louisville and Jefferson county, these are the men to steal away to neighboring towns there to meet the Democratic Governor of the State, and the Democratic candidate for U. S. Senator, to discuss and formulate plans, how the Democratic State ticket might gain success and the party prosper best. That is the kind of Democracy Mr. Beckham has been dealing out to his constituents, who have twice honored him with the highest office in the State and still more disgusting is the fact, that this editorial bureau at Frankfort, from which the above quoted article emanated, is still asking by way of its paid editorial space in the Post, that Beckham be again made the head of the Democratic party in Kentucky.

The editors of the Somerset Times and the Interior Journal have been devoting a portion of their space in criticism of the Signal and its editor because of his attitude in the Beckham fight. But as we are engaged now looking after the "Big Gun," the Post, and have no time to devote to such small concerns as the Times and Interior Journal, further attention to them will be deferred until some future period.
