W. H. Cox, seeking a pardon for her husband, Horace Norton, now serving a six year sentence in the penitentiary.

The woman said she was married when she was only sixteen. She was never allowed to get her husband out of prison. She told the acting Governor that her husband's brother had killed a man in a difficulty in Rockcastle county and her husband had been convicted as accessory and given a six years sentence. The Governor took no action in the case and told Mrs. Norton that he could not release her husband. She has taken up the matter with the Board of Prison Commissioners.

Dear Editor:—Please find space in your paper for the following statement: During these 4 years of my confinement since I was returned to prison, I have had so many detectives inquiring into the case of the killing of Mr. Rucker, the depot agent at Danville, Ky., and recently I have been asked the question of what I knew of Ansel Wilson. I desire to state that I never did want to tell things on the living, and as Ansel Wilson was killed by the officer at Hustonville, Ky, I have never told anyone of anything he and I did.

In order that the truth may be brought out, I will state that anyone living in Brodhead Ky., knows that I never met Wilson until after Mr. Rucker was killed at Danville. I have heard that Mr. Rucker was killed on Saturday night, Feb. 4th, 1904.

Mr. H. E. Roberts, at Junction City, has a little account book that I gave him, showing that I had been working at Memphis, Tenn., for the Corbathen Jones Shoe Mfg. Co.; it contains the case number of every pair of shoes I made and the Pay Roll book of that company will show that on Saturday, Feb. 4th, 1904, I drew my pay.

I have letters from a lady in Memphis, Mrs. Mary Langgan, 67 Popular street, that will show to anyone that I was at her place on business on Thanksgiving day, which was on last Thursday of November, 1903; I had a fight there at her place, and got a sentence of 30 days in a workhouse. It can be found that the name that I was going by, William Collins, is on record at the station house, and at the old work house; the keeper of the house has been there, he told me 20 years, and I suppose he is yet, his name is Collins.

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thing like ten days. I went to work for the shoe company I have mentioned above, worked two weeks, and on Feb. 4th, 1904, the very day the depot agent was killed at Danville, I left Memphis, Tenn., for the state of Texas, and to more clearly vindicate myself and to prove to the public that I did leave Memphis on that night I will state that anyone in Memphis will state that the bridge across the river is owned by a company and people are not permitted to walk over it only when the river is full of ice so that the boat cannot run, and then the bridge is open for travelers, and that that night, Feb. 4th, 1904, I walked over the bridge and took a freight trainbound for Little Rock Ark; I went to Denison, Texas; that I wrote to mother and she has the letter yet.

I do not remember how long I was making the trip from Denison, Texas, to St. Louis, Mo., but there I wrote mother again. I came from St. Louis by the way of Indianapolis, Ind; thence to Cincinnati, O., and came over what used to be the C. S. R. R. to Junction City, Ky., and there my nephew, Frank Weager, told me of the depot agent being killed; at this time it was about the 1st of March, 1904, I went up to see mother after staying a few days I met up with Ansel Wilson; had never seen or heard of him up to this time; what few days I was with him, he and I were, heartily drunk; he had no gun of any kind; neither had I any pistol. I only invite attention to the fact that the people around Brodhead know that I was not seen with Wilson until after the 1st of March, 1904.

I desire that the relatives of Mr. Rucker, the depot agent at Danville, to know that Ansel Wilson and I never knew anything at all of his death. The only pistol I ever had in my hands while out of prison on parole, was the .44 cal. S. & W., the one I took from James Owens, and as quick as I could sell it, I did so in Indianapolis, Ind.

It grieves me to know that I have been accused of such a crime as that, and therefore, give this statement to the people. Trusting you in advance for publishing same, I am, Yours most respectfully, ERIC NEWCOMB.
