Each school district is supposed to furnish its own ballot box, for the school election next Saturday. Any ordinary box will answer, provided it has a lock on it and not too heavy, but that it can be carried without too much difficulty. We would suggest that the officers appointed to hold election, see that a suitable ballot box is provided for their respective district. See list elsewhere in this issue for appointed officers.

Hon. Harvey Helm, Congressman from this district informs us that he has, until October next, the appointment of a Second Lieutenant in the U. S. Marine Corps, which appointment he desires shall go to some worthy young man in his district. The position pays \$1700 salary per annum during life or good behavior, with opportunity of promotion. It can be filled by any young man of good character, who is at least 21 years of age, and who can stand the mental and physical examinations that must precede the appointment. The latter are quite rigid, but any one who would care to undertake them would, if successful, receive appointment to what is considered a very desirable position in the Navy Department of the U. S. Government. Any worthy young man who so desires, can get into communication with the authorities who would arrange for his examinations by writing to Mr. Helm at Stanford.

We understand that the school election is getting pretty hot in some of the rural districts. The present school law is nothing but a "politics breeder", and if the people do not keep politics out, the schools not only in this but in every other county in the state, will be nothing but political machines. A splendid motto to adopt is not to vote for any man for school trustee who tries to bring politics into the race. The public schools of Kentucky are several years behind the times at the very best and to mix them up with politics which means they would be run and conducted on political lines, then we had just as well do away with them.

Another fact to be considered in the selection of trustees, is the splendid opportunity which will be presented for CRAP. The trustees who are elected next Saturday meet within thirty days after that time and each Educational Division selects one of the trustees elected in the Sub-districts, as chairman of that Educational division. These six chairmen, with the County Superintendent employ the teachers for every district in the county. If those six chairmen want to make it a graft proposition they can do it. If they are men who have the best interest of the county and the education of the little ones at heart, then we may expect the best results. For these reasons, we call upon the importance of selecting men as trustees who have no political axe to grind and men who are not looking for a graft.

NEWS ITEMS

The statement of the New York clearing-house banks for the past week shows that the banks hold \$52,728,400 more than the regular requirements of the 25 per cent. reserve rule. This is an increase of \$5,975,150 in the proportionate cash reserve as compared with the previous week.

L. O. Fay, of Addison, O., a suburb of Cincinnati, and a student at Georgetown, Ky., College, was drowned Sunday afternoon in Pillsboro Creek. He was a member of a boating party of three. Although the real opening of the presidential campaign is still some distance off the candidates of the two big parties and the various political campaign managers have a fairly active week in prospect. While ostensibly resting, in anticipation of the stirring times which are to come, all are combining considerable work with their pleasures. William J. Bryan, the Democratic presidential nominee, on Saturday will meet the sub-committee of the National Committee in Chicago, at which time the National Chairman will be selected. William H. Taft, presidential nominee of the Republican party, at Hot Springs, Va., will finish his speech of acceptance to the notification committee and to have it in readiness for their Cincinnati event the following week.

Judge Taft, in an interview Saturday announced that the Republican National Committee would accept no campaign contribution from corporations.

Since February the Government Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization has sent nearly 1,000 immigrants to different States where their services as farm laborers were in demand.

The Interstate Commerce Commission has thus far received no official information concerning the proposed general increase of freight rates. The commission, it is estimated, may take action in case such general increase is proposed.

It seems to be definitely settled that the medical colleges of Louisville are to be consolidated into one gigantic institution. We say "gigantic," but that is hardly the word. That smacks too much of new numbers while it is quality that is the important thing. "Strong" were better One, big strong college in the place of the several weaker individual ones is the prospect. It is a programme which the people of Louisville in general and the medical profession in particular may rightly indorse. The old conditions have not been habitually successful, either professionally or financially. The special sort of rivalry which was practiced, was not productive of the best results. With the best features and most skillful instructors of the individual colleges united in one institution, the proposed college should be without a superior in the country, for as is well known, Louisville stands at the very top in the rank of her physicians. There is material here for one of the most accomplished faculties that can be organized. And it is just such a faculty that the new college is expected to have.

It is a matter of congratulation for all concerned that the long-drawn-out negotiations are to have so happy an end.—Times.

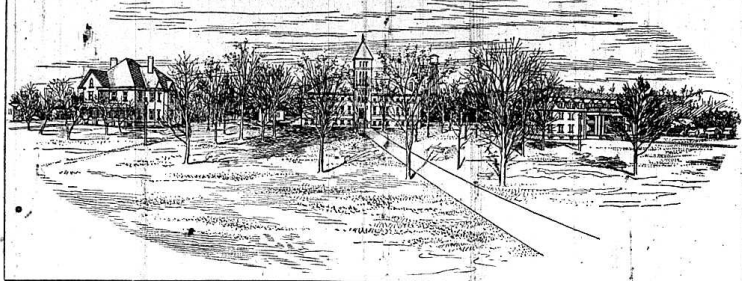

WOMAN TO DON STRIPE

Being convicted of an accessory in the murder of M. B. Snyder; Mrs. Sarah Steely, of Williams County, was sentenced to the penitentiary for five years at the Whitley term of Court last Thursday.

The conviction and sentence of the woman is one of the swiftest acts of justice that has been meted out to a criminal in Eastern Kentucky in many years, for the murder was only committed on the afternoon of July 4.

As far as could be learned the crime was an atrocious one and the woman is lucky to have escaped the gallows. It seems that Mrs. Steely bore a grudge against Mr. Snyder, although she and the family were on good terms with him. He was invited to go to her house on July 4, and the murder shows that her purpose was to entice him there.

Whitley county is a local option county, and Mrs. Steely always had beverages on hand—sometimes selling them and sometimes giving them away.

She planned to celebrate the Fourth however, not only by drinking, but also with a carnival of crime.

Mr. Snyder went to the Steely house as he had been invited, and after a few drinks had been taken, Mrs. Steely became very insulting to him and quarreled with him because she said, he had testified against her in the Federal court.

Mr. Snyder endeavored to reason the abuse out at that moment when Mrs. Steely signalled her 16-year-old son Granville to attack Mr. Snyder, which he did, with a knife stabbing him so badly that he died the following Monday morning.

The bitterest feeling existed in Williamsburg as a result of the murder and the lawyers of that bar volunteered their service to prosecute the woman.

The murdered man was a brother of J. B. Sa yder, Commonwealth's Attorney of the 20th Judicial District, and brother-in-law to C. S. Wilson, employed as Clerk in the office of the Court of Appeals. He was also a member of one of the most prominent families in Eastern Kentucky.

All the Kentuckians who traveled to Denver were gratified over the fact that from the top of the bell until the convention was adjourned the Bluegrass State set the pace. The others followed.
