EX-Senator T. R. Welch, of Nicholasville, has announced his candidacy for the State Senate in that district. He is a very popular democrat and was one of Gov. Goebel's attending physicians during his last illness.

The Taylor County Sentinel is the name of a new paper which will make its appearance at Campbellsville. The paper will be Democratic and will have for its editor a persevering young Democrat, James Mathews, of Taylor county.

BROKE ALL RECORDS

Recent Bahaman Hurricane Exceeded Great Storm of 1886. Nassau, Bahama, Sept. 30. - Only fragmentary reports have reached the seat of government here as to the damage done to the outlying islands of the Bahamas which were ravaged by a hurricane from the 11th to the 14th inst., but such news as has arrived is sufficiently bad. The storm appears to have originated near Turks Island and swept with increasing fury up the entire string of islands northeast from here. Jaeger, Acklins, Crooked, Ragged Fortune, Long, Walling, and Blue Cay, forming the south part of Andros islands, all appear to have suffered. On Long Island the gale blew for days and the settlements are practically obliterated from end to end, the principal place, Clarenceville, being only five houses left standing. The inhabitants were forced to find shelter in caves, and food and water were almost unobtainable. The government steamer Douglas was blown from her anchorage at Long Bay and was driven across to the island. Many other boats were lost, but it will be weeks before the full account will reach Nassau. There is no doubt that the loss of life is heavy. The whole countryside, even so far as Cat Island, is scalded and buried as it with fire, from the terrible driving of the salt water across the land. While the actual money loss is insignificant, the losses destroyed, for the most part being mere shanties, nevertheless the loss to the owners is severe, representing a vast area, practically everything that they possessed. The government has taken relief measures and schooners are being daily dispatched laden with food stuffs, lumber and nails.

THE REPUBLICAN CAMPAIGN. The crisis is said to have exceeded in fury the hurricane of 1886, which has always been the standard of comparison. Unlike that of the present one was defeated through its course and traveled northeast and north, the present one is said to be moving from the west coast of the island, and the nearer islands which were wrecked in 1886, have this time escaped with nothing but a stiff blow.

LONDON'S UNEMPLOYED. Serious Problem Confronts the World Metropolis. London, Sept. 30. - The problem of dealing with the unemployed in the great centers of population throughout the United Kingdom is being seriously considered by the government authorities, all of whom agree that the number of persons out of work will be greater the coming winter than in many years before. No estimate has been made of the unemployed in London, but a census taken by the newspapers of provincial cities shows the following numbers. The conditions at Glasgow are probably worse than in most of the other cities, including 22,000 men now seeking work at that place. Sunderland has 18,000 unemployed; Birmingham 10,000; Liverpool 14,000; Manchester 8,000, and other cities from 2,000 to 3,000 each. These figures do not include the great army of strikers in the Lancashire cotton trade. Distress funds are now being raised throughout the country.

PASTOR HITS PUG HOMECOMING Arraigns Program in Honor of Billy Papke. Kewanee, Ill., Sept. 30. - A scorching arraignment of pug fighting was made by J. W. Nelson, pastor of the First Congregational church, in entering a disclaimer that the widely heralded homecoming reception here last week for Billy Papke, champion middle-weight fighter, was to be considered a denigration of representative opinion in Kewanee. He declared the influence of pug dog fighting on the morals and that Kewanee does not desire to acquire a reputation as the "slug-gut center" of the country.

FIND MAN'S BODY IN WEEDS Bloomington Has Mystery in Discovery of Decomposed Remains. Bloomington, Ill., Sept. 30. - A murder mystery of the south for a well-dressed man aged about forty-five and bald-headed, was found hidden in a clump of weeds on the Chicago & Alton right of way with a bullet hole through the head. A big gold piece and a revolver lay near the corpse. Two fountain pens and a conductor's hat checked Chicago in St. Louis. "We also found."
