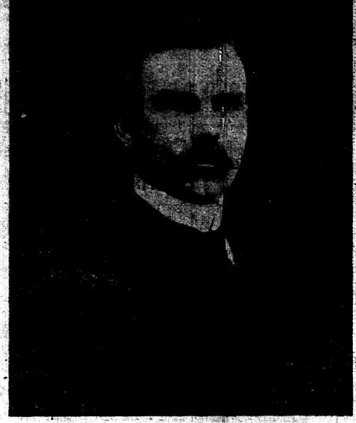

PREPARING FOR WAR.

In the fall and winter is the time for the farmers to prepare for war on predaceous insects, insects, scabs and the coming adverse seasons. When it is too wet or too cold to do out-door work is the time to lay out the coming season's work. You have already outlined the system of rotation of crops you will follow, and now you can calculate on what you will do with the outlying land which you have and which must bear crops in order to retain its vitality and prove profitable. For you should no more have idle lands or people who should have idle hands or idle people on your farm. In the first place see that all land you intend using the coming year, and that all the land you have in cultivable condition, is fit broken to a depth of not less than four inches, and fully one inch deeper than at the previous breaking. Before doing this scatter all the manure you can scrape up on your place evenly over the land. Don't burn anything off your land. Turn all under that it may make humus for humus is the life of soil. The deeper the land is broken the greater the protection against drought next year. For corn and other crops are dependent on the soil. Don't you believe them save in wet season.

Do not confine yourself to single crop; such a farmer always poor. FINANCE AND IMMIGRATION. Financial depression in the United States have largely to do with a decrease of immigration and an increase of emigration. The New York figures for the year up to an including October, 1908, are said to show a decrease as against 1907 of 956,329; also, that there is an increase for same time in emigration are of considerable interest. From 1820, when records were commenced, to the close of 1907 the immigration amounted to 2,578,385,237 persons. Add to this 2,500,000, as an estimate of the immigration from 1789 to 1820, and we have a total of 26,235,237. For all practical purposes of comparison these figures are correct. If we are to presume that economic conditions, including financial depression, in the United States have to do considerably with immigration, we are supported by many peculiar figures for a calculation. That falling off during the year 1901 to close in supposed to be due to what in New York has become known as the "great panic of 1906-7." We find, according to the tables, that in 1873 the failures amounted to \$248,400,000, while the immigration that year was 469,803, more or nearly 50,000 than in the preceding year. But in the following years of 1864 and 1875 the immigration was only 313,339 and 227,798 respectively.

There was annual decrease of immigration down to 1879, when it fell to 177,856. During those years failures were very heavy, reaching 10,478 instances, involving \$334,383,132. In 1884 and 1885 there was another increase of failures, being 10,968 and 10,637 respectively, with the amounts estimated at \$228,343,427 and \$124,326,343. The immigration in 1884 was 218,207, but for the years 1886 and 1886 it dropped to 395,349 and 334,203. In 1893, the most disastrous in totals in the financial history of our country, there were reported 15,242 failures, for \$316,779,889. In 1892 immigration had again reached a high tide, being 648,743. But the close of 1893 resulted in a reduction of immigration to 314,467 for 1894 and 279,948 for 1895.

Following recovery of the country from those disastrous times the immigration increased wonderfully showing 1,005,107,421; 1,096,140,735, and in 1907 1,285,340.—Eugene
