### The National Capital will vibrate

and hum not only with Congress next week but with a variety of conventions National scope and importance. Half a dozen organizations well be in session in Washington with several hundred of the country's most prominent citizens considering and debating questions looking to public betterment. The National Rivers and Harbors Congress, the Southern Commercial Congress, the National Council of Commerce, and the National Conservation Commission confer with the Governors of the States are the events around which most interest centers. Besides these gatherings will be the convention of the National Liquor League and the National League of Democratic Clubs. The National Conservation Commission will meet in conference with the Governors of States and both the President and the President elect and a notable array of prominent men will discuss the conservation of the National resources of the country.

### NEWS ITEMS

Indications are that there will be a clash between miners and anthracite coal operators when the present agreement expires on April 1. A cablegram from the Foo, China says that two Japanese steamships collided off the port and it is believed that 700 persons were drowned. Controller of the Currency Murray has issued a call on national banks for a statement of their condition at the close of business November 27. Gov. Wilson has decided to have a semi-annual examination of the State's books made and will probably recommend to the Legislature that a controller be employed to further safeguard the State's money.

The Atlantic battleship fleet under Rear Admiral Sperry has sailed from Manila. The next port of call is Colombo, Ceylon.

Attorneys for Ray Lamphere have appealed his case to the Indiana Supreme Court. Lamphere was convicted of arson, the case growing out of Guinness' tragedies at LaPorte, Ind.

The recent rains have made it possible for tobacco to be priced, and the members of the Burley Tobacco Society are rapidly delivering their crops at the warehouses where it is to be inspected.

The purpose of the Ways and Means Committee to draft a new tariff bill materially reducing the Dingley schedules is disturbing Republican Senators who now expect that the only hope of preventing a lowering of duties is in the senate.

Herbert L. Saterlee, of New York, who on Monday was offered the position of Assistant Secretary of the Navy to succeed Mr. Newberry, who has been elevated to be head of the department, Tuesday notified the President of his acceptance of the appointment.

What a serious mistake and only realized when it is everlasting too late. Dr. Kinaman struck a very heavy blow upon sanitary conditions, as he found them in many of the public schools a matter which is seriously overlooked in many of our schools. We regret that no few of the sanitary teachers were present, to hear these splendid talks.

State Supt. Crabbe is to be commended for the strong effort which he is exerting to improve our schools and advance education of the people, one in to do this part, to assist him in this great and glorious work of improving our schools, of the status of the public schools.
