NEWS ITEMS

Representative Champ Clark of Missouri, was chosen minority leader of the House Saturday night at a caucus of the Democratic members of that body. He was placed in nomination by John Starn Williams, his predecessor.

Liquor legislation, past and prospective, and the trend of popular sentiment in the direction of sentiment in the direction of prohibition was discussed by the National Liquor League at its 15th annual convention in Washington on Tuesday, and the N. W. State hotel men, who met in New York City on the following day, were likely to have said something on the same subject.

A clash between a probation officer and a party of street preachers in a Kentucky city developed into a general fight between the latter and a party of officers. Before the battles were ended one patrolman and a little girl was killed, John Sharp, a preacher known as 'Adam God,' and two other policemen were fatally wounded, and a probation officer and a policeman slightly hurt. About 100 shots were fired during the affray, which occurred in front of the city hall.

The last session of the Sixtieth Congress is now sitting in Washington. It will adjourn in three months, simultaneously with the end of President Roosevelt's administration. It may be predicted with much certainty that there will be little or no new legislation at this session. For three or four weeks the Ways and Means Committee of the lower house has been listening to rhetoric on tariff revision, but no bill will be reported at this session. Mr. Taft is expected to call a special session after March the fourth and it is presumably for use at this session that this useless rubbish before the Committee on Ways and Means is heard and recorded.

The Monetary Commission appointed at the last session, of which Senator Aldrich of Rhode Island is head, has been junketing in Europe and is imagined by some to have studied and provisionally probed the business question at financial centers abroad. It is as much as it has six years, in which to do so-called work, there is no probability that it will report a bill this winter.

The President, backed by the more progressive officers of the Navy, is anxious to have a new law passed reorganizing the Navy Department, but legislation is only three or four months before him and to this Congress he will probably have to leave this reorganization policy with many others to his successor. There will be opposition to it just as there was to the bill for the reorganization of the Army which Mr. Root, then Secretary of War, was unable to have enacted until after two years of strenuous effort.

There is belief in some quarters that a River and Harbor bill will be passed before the fourth of March. There is urgent need for the improvement of the waterways, but economy is the slogan that is heard from all sides. The deficit last year amounted to five millions a month and this year it is not far from ten millions a month.

The Pres. and the advocates for a greater Navy are insisting on more money for dreadnaughts and the opponents of the House are determined in their opposition.

In a few days, the Postal Savings Bank bill will have the floor in the Senate and Senator Foraker, it is said will call up the Brownsville affair on the 16th of the month.
