### WILLIAM MCKINLEY.

Regardless of party lines, the American nation will associate itself in the tender tribute of affection paid by the President-elect to that best beloved of Presidents, William McKinley. Consecrated by a ghastly tragedy at a time when his temperate and gentle statesmanship had attained its highest fruition; his memory's precious heritage and a noble example to the people, the time has come when one may contemplate his inspiring career in its true perspective.—Contracts are invidious, and frequently unfair, and it may well be that the brusquerie and unadvised severer of his contract has put us the hater to acknowledge the untoward fact and prize of the great man he was called upon to succeed. And Mr. Taft in disclosing his suspicious inclinations over those whom he had chosen to carry on
