The other party may have some duty very important to attend to just then. If you talk longer than three minutes on some lines you will be charged extra time."

"When the telephone rings answer by speaking your name, firm, residence, or store, thus Mrs. (or Mr.) Jones, Jones' Farm, Jones' Residence or Jones' Grocery Store, whichever the case may be, eliminating all the 'Hello's' or 'Who's'."

"We can readily comprehend the advantage of this, for almost immediately the parties are ready for conversation. Talk directly into the transmitter, distinctly. Do not speak too loudly, but for low listening is very annoying to the one listening."
