HUMAN SKULLS HIS TARGET

Claude Stutzer was the original bad boy of the Mt. Washington neighborhood, if half of what the neighbors said about him is true. What they said was plenty twice over to send him to Knoxville, where the state of Missouri has reformatory. Judge H. L. McCune made the order in the Juvenile Court yesterday.

It might not have gone so bad with Claude had he not shot and killed John Parks, a playmate, on Christmas Day. The neighbors many of them, said that Claude was 19 and that he had been accepted for enlistment in the army, subject to physical examination. But the young man said he was 15, and so it was the reform school.

"Put him away somewhere," Judge, pleaded the mother of Parks. "He has killed my boy and there is danger for every child in the neighborhood as long as he is there."

And then they began to go into Claude's past. There was the story of many "dime novels," only the matter-of-fact courts refer to them as "five-cent novels," for that's what they cost in these days. There was another tale of how he had had picked out a box car for his very own, making a home and a pretense out of it. And then there was a narrative of how the boy was seen with a girl.

Why, said A. P. Ronda,

justice of the Peace in Sugar Creek "this boy dug skeletons from an old burying ground near Mt. Washington. He took the rings off the fingers. The skulls he set up for targets for his rifle. Sometimes he put a cigar or a cigarette in a hole in a skull and tried to shoot away the tobacco. I have had him in Court on complaint of the neighbors."

A storekeeper of the neighborhood related how he was going home one night when he boy halted him at the muzzle of a rifle. As soon as he saw the merchant plainly enough to recognize him he apologized for the case of mistaken identity.

In sentencing Claude Judge H. L. McCune showed his enmity to the "gun-toting" practice. Said the Judge: "It ought to be a crime to point a gun at any one. I'm going to put a stop to this carrying of guns by boys."—Kansas City Journal.

NEWS ITEMS

The work of counting the 150,000 ballots cast in the national election of the coal miner's union in December has begun at the United Mine Workers' national headquarters in Indianapolis.

The fight against the Alabama prohibition law was opened Saturday in a petition filed by lawyers of Montgomery in the United States Court. The petitioners are the Cook Brewing Company of Indiana, who allege that the law will mean a loss to them of \$125,000 a year in business.

Officials of the American Locomotive Company in New York announced that the company had purchased a plot of 130 acres of land at Gray, Ind., and that plans were being drawn for a new plant, which, when completed, will give employment to from 24,000 to 35,000 workmen.

Contributions to the fund for the relief of the Italian earthquake sufferers, which was started in Louisville Friday at a meeting of the combined Italian societies of the city, are being liberally made. No canvass has yet been made by the committee on solicitation, and in less than two days there has been received over \$1,500. Theodore Abrams sent from the West his personal check for \$200. The first contributor at the time was a man of Jewish faith.

Representatives Paterson, Lever and Legare, Democrats of South Carolina, will retain their seats in the House. This decision was reached by the unanimous vote of the Elections Committee No. 1 Tuesday.

After the holiday lull, the Government's fight looking to the dissolution of the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey was resumed in New York before Special Examiner Frank D. Ferriss.

The Franklin county grand jury returned thirty-five indictments against Judge Charles E. Roe, former claim clerk in the office of the State Auditor, charging forgery, uttering lorgery and defrauding the State with false vouchers.

The commission named by the President to recommend regulation for carrying out the pure food act's provisions as far as the labeling of whisky is concerned will report next week. Important changes in the present rules probably will be recommended, but may not meet executive approval.

A dispatch from Greensburg says E. E. Perkins has assigned as Sheriff of Green county because of the decision of the United States Supreme Court, putting Green county liable for \$250,000 worth of bonds voted to aid in the construction of the Cumberland and Ohio Railroad in 1877.

The State-wide prohibition bill was introduced in the Tennessee Senate by Senator Hilliard. The bill is a practical reaffirmation of the four-mile law now in force with the exceptions in the old law omitted. Later it is understood a measure will be introduced prohibiting the manufacture of intoxicating liquors in Tennessee.

The leaders of the Barley Tobacco Society voted themselves nice salaries at their meeting at Winchester, which adjourned Wednesday. The president is to get \$5,000 per year and expenses; seven executive committees, \$2,000 each and expenses, and forty-three district chairmen \$500 a year each.
