**FRIDAY—LUCKY OR UNLUCKY.**

A dispatch from Lexington says Whether the burley tobacco growers form a pool or not this year, the largest crop of tobacco ever grown in Central Kentucky will undoubtedly be planted, and the warehouses of this city are beginning to make arrangements for handling at the auction sales next fall, more tobacco than they have in any previous year. Shelburne & Sons will add an extension 70 by 270 feet to their present warehouse and will begin the work in a few weeks. The Growers' Warehouse will build an additional story, and the Barker and Query warehouses, will also enlarge their capacity, so that the warehouses of this city will be able next fall to handle 1,000,000 lbs of tobacco a day. It is also reported that J. C. Dixon, of Mullins, S. C. will build a new warehouse in this city this coming summer.

**HON. B. J. BETHURUM**

Whose announcement as a candidate for Circuit Judge of the 38th Judicial District, composed of Laurel and Rockcastle counties, and served as a member of the General Assembly during the troubled times originating out of the contest between Coebel and Taylor over the Governorship of Kentucky. In the debate incident to the contest he showed force of character and leadership when the Legislature adjourned to meet at Louisa, he was unanimously chosen Speaker pro tem of that body.

Three years ago he moved to Somerset, Pulaski county, and formed a partnership for the purpose of practicing law, with Hon. J. N. Sharp and Judge J. S. Cooper. He at once took front rank at the Pulaski bar and is recognized as one of its ablest members. He acted for two years as Commonwealth's Attorney pro tem, and until the resignation of Commonwealth Attorney J. N. Sharp, where he was appointed by Gov. Augustus E. Wilcox to fill the vacancy which was to be filled at the general election in 1908. For the short term of this office he was nominated by his party without opposition, and defeated the Democratic opponent, Judge Frank Harrison, by an overwhelming majority, leading the Republican ticket to the District.

The friends of Mr. Bethurum in this county, who have watched his career personally and professionally, are delighted to have the opportunity of supporting him for the position of Circuit Judge, which position he is well qualified to fill. They commend him to the voters of the adjoining counties as being a man of ability, earnestness in the discharge of public or private duty, and a Republican always loyal.

### THE CICERO OF THE MOUNTAINS LIKES STANFORD JAIL.

(From Interior Journal.)  
"Because of the condition of the Lincoln county jail, which is a reproach to civilization, I pardon this boy," said Gov. Wilson.  
What a foul sander on Mrs. Agnes Herrin, the widowed jailer of the noblest man that God Almighty ever made! I have passed many pleasant days in the sunny walls of that delightful winter resort. At no hotel in the State was I ever kinder or better treated, or cheaper or better fed—my board being entirely free and regularly brought to my apartments. Coffee, meat, bread, biscuits, potatoes, beans, turnips, etc., and the inmates so polite, I spoke and treated on fruits and legumes every day and no auditor ever arose and left me while I was speaking. When I reluctantly left the jail, which was after being threatened with an ejection, I left 27 sighting voters behind me. Mr. Herrin promised to let me stay a few days over my time. In visiting jails to see clients and my own misdeameans, I have been confined in several houses of correction, but I have never seen any jail better or more orderly kept and prisoners who were fortunate enough to spend there during the winter, or as a summer resort, better fed. That was the reason it was crowded last February when I was there. The lamented Herrin was a nobleman and his widow is now a Dutchess dowager. I hope the gallant governor will take back a thoughtful declaration unsupported by the facts. I have been a considerable interest in the jail. My grand, aristocratic kinfolks built one-sixth of it and I am entitled to free board there now and then. As the "Mountain Tigris," Cynthia Frye, said when they were putting her in the Mt. Vernon jail, "I built that jail and have had no good of it yet." I never get in jail only when in law and politics and shall be in it both this year. I expect to be in jail before the summer campaign is over and in Frankfort when it ends. Hoping that justice will be done to the prisoners, Mrs. Agnes Herrin, president of the Citizens' department of the Stanford Hotel, whose mission is a jail.

Mrs. Clara Edmunds, a former resident of Trigg county, died in Tennessee, aged 104 years.

The Baptist church at Horse Cave will be torn down in a short time and replaced with a handsome brick structure on the same site.  
Lexington Daughters of the Confederacy will give a play, "The Southern Cross," to raise money for the Gen. John Morgan monument fund.  
James Stewart and Frank Lagear, alleged Cumberland Mountain bandits, were captured near Middlesboro, after defying the authorities for years.  
Mrs. Ellen Hussey, a cripple, was sandbagged into insensibility at her home in the suburbs of Henderson by an unidentified white man, who made his escape.  
Mrs. Thomas Francis, aged fifty-six years, of Treacy, Barren county, can nitel suicide by hanging herself in the smokehouse. Constant brooding over her husband's death is assigned the cause.  
Charges of the illegal use of money in the recent Republican State primary were filed against Senator Isaac Stephenson at the meeting of the Wisconsin Senate Tuesday in Madison.  
The State Optician Commission is considering the bids for furnishing the new building. Three Kentucky firms submitted jointly, through the Ford & Johnson Company, the lowest bid.  
Senator Samuel Sells, of Washington county, and Representative Walter White, of Eddy county, introduced in the Tennessee Senate and House Monday companion bills to prohibit the sale of orders for the purchase of alcoholic liquors to be in this or some other State.

Six committees of both branches of Congress are busy with the work that has fallen to them as a result of the clashes between the President and the national legislative body. The questions arising out of the Newfoundland fisheries dispute will be submitted to The Hague tribunal for arbitration, according to a treaty agreed upon by Secretary Root and the representatives of Great Britain. On an indictment charging him with larceny on September 30, 1907, of \$145,000 from the Borough Bank of Brooklyn, William Gow, a farmer director of the bank, was placed on trial in the Supreme Court in Brooklyn Monday.  
The retirement from business of Sidney C. Love & Co., one of the largest brokerage houses in the country, with offices in Chicago, New York and other cities, was announced Monday. The withdrawal is attributed to business conditions.  
Phleide Frigerio and R. M. Sheffield, who were charged with operating a betting book at City Park track, New Orleans, several weeks ago, were Monday sentenced to serve seven months in prison by Judge Chretien in the Criminal District Court. Each man also was fined \$350.  
Two much ridicule is heaped on the gentleman farmer, said the Secretary of Agriculture at a banquet of gentleman farmers in Wash.ington. After thunderous applause died down Mr. Wilson continued: "Too many of us take the view of the gentleman farmer that an old friend of mine in Ohio takes. Gentleman farmers he granted one day in my hearing. Everybody knows what a gentleman farmer is. Well, what is he? said I impatiently. Oh, said my old friend, he is man capable enough to run a farm as it should be run, and rich enough to stand the loss."
