State of New York to have enacted a bill to make everyone who sells a pistol take a description of the person to whom it is sold, to require the purchaser to display a license to carry a pistol and to make public the records of all dealers in firearms, says the Lexington Herald.

It is to be hoped that this law will be enacted and given a fair test that it may be found whether it will be of so great service as is expected. While, of course, pistols are not the only weapons carried concealed—such as stiletts, sawed shot and brass knuckles all coming under the prohibition of the law against concealed deadly weapons—nevertheless it is with pistols that crimes of violence are most usually committed, particularly in the Southern States. The law in Alabama which, as we recall, prohibits the sale of any pistol less than twenty-five inches in length is being tried, and various other States are making efforts to find what can be done to prevent the iniquitous habit of carrying concealed weapons by the time the session of the Kentucky Legislature meets next January some members of that body who is interested in the enactment of a law to prevent the carrying of concealed weapons ought to find out what has been the effect of the various laws passed in other States. We hope some Representative or Senator will make a special study of these laws and make it his special business to have a good law passed in this State.

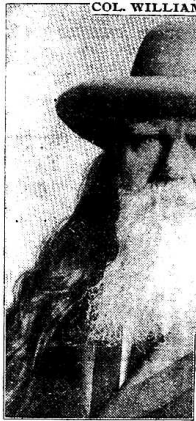

REDD—Dr. R. G. Redd, after an illness lasting more than twelve years, died last Sunday night at the home of his brother, Mr. Charles Redd, Crab Orchard. Dr. Redd, in his younger days and before affliction came upon him was a very brainy and active man and was a great chemist in appearance. From the *Mountain Blue Book* we get this bit of interesting history regarding his life and life's work. He was born in Knox county Ky. August 16, 1842; studied medicine in the Ohio College of Medicine Cincinnati graduating from that institution in 1869 and from Bellevue Medical College, New York in 1871; practiced medicine in Rockcastle county two years when he entered the U. S. Army as Assistant Surgeon acting between times in Kentucky, North and South Carolina; and Fort Lincoln, Dakota, finally accompanying the Fifth Infantry to Fort Kough in 1877. In 1881 he resigned from the army and entered the practice of medicine at Miles City Montana; was elected Mayor of that city in 1889 and in the first legislative body that ever assembled in Montana he was the Democratic State Senator from Curtis county, and until force to leave his post because of failing health was an important factor in that new-made state.

Returning to Kentucky about twelve years ago, he has since made his home at Crab Orchard with his brother and for many years has been almost as helpless as an infant. His remains were laid to rest Tuesday afternoon with Masonic honors in Crab Orchard cemetery.

WOULD LIKE TO SEE A GOOD ROADSCAMPAIN

[From Courier Journal contributed by Dr. A. G. Lovell.]

Some repetitions of a former article is unavoidable in this, but the question of better and cheaper roads for the general public, and for the farming class in particular is one that should enlist influential men in every community. The ever-increasing traffic and the prices that farm products command are strong reasons why the country roads should have more attention. The constant improvement in service, and at the same time, reduction of expense of automobile travel, suggests an exchange of commodities between communities that previously had very little interest in common. Moreover, it would in a measure make some communities more independent of the railroads and enable them to secure better accommodations at the hands of said companies. It would give an impetus to a kind of travel that would afford pleasure, be conducive to health and prove profitable in many ways. The question very naturally arises: "How are these things to be brought about?" I answer: "By a campaign of agitation and education."

If every county would select a short piece of road over which there was a great deal of travel and much heavy traffic, and build it according to the latest and most approved methods, it would prove an object lesson worth more than volumes of theory.

It has been demonstrated that the best country road consists of a combination of macadam and asphalt. "The macadam highway with a strip of asphalt in the middle" is destined to be the road of the future. But you say, asphalt roads are too expensive; we are not able to build them! It is not so. The asphalt dressing will cost less than half the cost of the macadam. It consists of a fine grain sand rock saturated with bitumen. This sandstone, crushed or broken to

the same consistency as the limestone and spread over the middle of the road, about the same depth as you would cover it with screenings or gravel to make it smooth. Heavy traffic will in a short time mix and grind this asphalt into the other stone. This soon becomes smooth and elastic, is impervious to water, and dust will not accumulate on it.

Several of the States have enough native asphalt available to supply local demands. Kentucky is especially fortunate in that particular; some of her properties have been developed and have proven valuable, but she has many times more undeveloped properties of this kind than are now in operation. They consist of segregated lands in different localities, which makes an asphalt promise in Kentucky untenant and prompts to better subserve the interests of the people.

Your correspondent would be delighted to see others take this matter up and inaugurate a "good roads" campaign that will help to bring our grand old Commonwealth to the front.
