Supreme Court, instructed the jury to find "not guilty and the \$29240.000 fine against the Standard Oil Co., is a thing of the past. Now that the Standard is released so far as that charge is concerned, wonder if John D. is going to hold the string for a while longer or will he allow business to resume its natural course? The \$29240.000 fine against the Standard Oil Co., is the logical reason for the panic which has been for the last year, and a warning to those leading the procession to let up or suffer the consequence. An appalling situation that, a one man power such as the Standard Oil Co., with John D. Rockefeller at its head, who has such a controlling power, as to be able at any time to say what shall and what shall not be. Are we a free people or what are we?"

No bribe could be more discretable or more sure to destroy its influence than the injection of politics into the State Farmers Institute. There were unmistakable evidences that this was done in the famous hotel here. One of the signatures of it was shown in the large representation from the mountain counties. Twenty of these counties had delegates here when

heretofore only three or four of these counties have been represented. Another evidence was to see the chairman by taking from the president and also from the district the appointment of the committees and selecting them by a resolution naming them from the floor of the institute. The purpose of this was apparent. It was to de-liciate if every officer in every district, as a member of the State Board. Not because he was not efficient or faithful, but because he was a Democrat. The Republicans had a decided majority of the counties and they used the majority to accomplish their purposes which were in this particular a partisan nature. —Elizabeth News.

"LOCAL OPTION"

The people of Rockcastle county know what local option means. Something over ninety counties out of one hundred and nineteen have adopted a law prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors, in their respective counties. Since the local option law has been in force it has been shown that the expense of arrests, convictions, jail sentences etc, has diminished by more than one-half, so much so that the office of "jailer" has become in many places so worthless that the state has been asked to make it a salaried office, in view of the fact that the fees for services rendered and the profit of bootlegging business has been so reduced that the jailer can't support his family, especially in dry territory. Some people in Rockcastle county do not know that nearly three-fourths of all the expenses of state government, are the result of criminal prosecutions and that perhaps 80 per cent of these of crimes is directly or indirectly caused by the use of intoxicating liquors.

The liquor business furnishes more business for criminal courts than all else combined. Day by day in the police courts of large cities, and some small towns, a long docket of new and "bootlegged" cases are awaiting judgment where police are "bootlegged". The point in all this argument is the enormous expense that is incurred in criminal prosecution brought about by liquor. It is not necessary now to say anything about the turning of homes, the

debauching influences that blight young lives and all the train of evils that surround us on every side.

The people of Rockcastle know this and they know how much has been accomplished by local option, and some know how much more could be accomplished by local option, and some know how much more could be accomplished if every officer in every neighborhood would do his duty.

Every officer of this commonwealth takes a solemn oath to perform the duties of his office to the best of his ability, and there is not a law on the statute books that cannot be enforced if the officers will do their duty. There is just one other thing in this relation that has brought to Rockcastle that ought to be known.

The local option law when advanced to "County Unit" dimensions is the most powerful and the most dreaded foe to the liquor trade. When applied to every county in Kentucky, the liquor traffic is doomed.

If Kentucky alone was the field in which this contest is raging, it would not be worth the ink and paper on which this article is written but "state wide" is a feeble expression. The subject is world wide, and we are in the fight to win.

There never has been a time when the fight has been so fierce. The trade in one state punishes the party that opposes it by electing state officers of the opposite party. In Indiana the republicans are punished in Kentucky, the Democrats got a "heating" and so it goes.

Physically to fight to be known by friends of temperance in any form that the liquor trade sends drummers into all dry territory selling suspiciously distasteful medicine, and are employing attorneys to defend "boot leggers". Blind men furnish money to pay their fines, and in every way to defend the local option laws now present.

That causes men to kill, to rob, to commit murder, to destroy homes, and they flourish and grow rich where they can induce men to drink. It is their business to make as many customers as possible, and when one is thoroughly made, he is a customer for life, as long as he can take wife and children's food, clothing, and means of education to pay for the stuff.

The good people of Kentucky are not going to stand for this sort of thing any longer. The people of Rockcastle are going to stand by their officers. They stand for good government and they know there is not one element of good government in the liquor trade nor in the stuff they sell. If any body can prove to me that the use of liquor is good for man's good for health, good for the family, good for the church, good for widows and orphans, good to reduce taxation, good for municipal state and national prosperity, I will take the stump, or be a drummer, or do any thing, even pray for the success of the saloon. Fellow citizens we know it is a curse on us all, and must cease. Will we do our duty? Very devotedly
