The 1909 Census gave the total amount of creamery butter made in the United States as 420,116,000 lbs. In 1914 the figures had increased to 531,480,000 and it is estimated that the 1910 figures will reach July 725,000,000 pounds.

Every spring you hear the croakers. Already they have begun their pessimistic assertions that the fruit crop has been killed. This is not true, for we have interviewed several who are authority on matters pertaining to fruit and they say the fruit crop may get sold between now and May, but so far the buds are in good condition for fruit bearing.

Figures issued by the Department of Agriculture show that up to January 1, last, there were 20,690,000 horses valued at \$1,974,052,000 on farms the same date last year, and at \$1,877,530,000. There were also during 1908, 4,053,000 mules, 21,720,000 milch cows and 50,084,000 sheep. The total value of horses, mules, cows and sheep on farms during the year was \$3,765,710,000.

The continued rains have greatly retarded all sorts of farm work. Especially have they been a hindrance to tobacco raisers who have been anxiously waiting an opportunity to sow their plant beds. Plowing is at a standstill and about all that can be done is to look after the stock. The weatherman seems to think that he can improve the brand we have been having in a very short while, which will no doubt be good news to the tillers of the soil.

The brood mare that is about to bring a foal should be looked to as the time draws near. Any quiet paddock or pasture will be the best place to turn her in, provided there is no shad-bug, but to give her. If the mare is put in pasture, care should be especially taken to allow no aules to get at large in it. These creatures seem to have so much curiosity about a young horse foal that they will carry it to death if it gets separated from its mother. After a few days, however, the foal is in no danger from mules.

There is a report that E. H. Harriman has in mind a scheme to bring about a mutual understanding in regard to traffic arrangements between all the rail roads of the country and a uniformity of rates that will be generally to the benefit of the stockholders, and that the conference, which is to be held at Pasadena while Mr. Harriman is here, will be concerned more or less with the plan.

All of the railroad men who are to take part in the conference have arrived and nothing of importance has yet been attempted. Mr. Harriman evidently expects that Congress, at the special session will make some amendments to the laws governing the Interstate Commerce Commission's work which would permit of the merger. He seemed surprised over the fact that mention of the matter had not been made before.

Mr. Harriman was asked: How soon do you expect the railroads to resume work on the improvement of lines contemplated before the panic?

You may say he answered, "that as soon as an amendment is passed giving the Interstate Commerce Commission power to allow the railroads to enter into a mutual agreement—that is, permitting the strong roads of the country to extend their credit and protect the weaker roads—just so soon will long contemplated improvements be rushed through to completion.

This means, of course, the expenditure of an immense amount of money, and I believe eventually it will result in a reduction in the cost of operation and in charges.
