### HIGH BRIDGE

The work of rebuilding High Bridge on the Queen and Crescent route across the Kentucky river is to begin in a short time.

The plans and specifications are about completed and the preliminary work is already in progress and from now until the new bridge is completed the company will have a gang of men on the job.

The bridge and residence of M. Curtis Langtry, Jr., the resident engineer who will superintend the work of the new bridge is about completed and Mr. Langtry will move into them in a few days to remain there until after the new bridge has been finished.

The new bridge will occupy the same position as the present one and will be a trestle bridge on account of carrying a double track which is a good deal wider than the present one. The bridge will be one of the most modern in design and construction of the section of the country. Concrete and steel will be used chiefly in the new structure, the concrete being used only for the abutments. The actual work of building the new bridge will begin within the next three weeks.

WRITES ENTERTAININGLY OF NIAGARA RIVER AND THE FALLS  
Niagara is an American Indian word meaning "thundering water". The Niagara River flows from Lake Erie to Lake Ontario and is the outlet for the whole drainage of lakes Superior, Huron, Michigan, Saint Clair and Erie. The surface of Erie, where the river begins, is three hundred twenty-six feet higher than the level of Ontario, where it ends. The river is thirty three miles long, and its direction is from South to North. The water is clear and pure. The volume of water which enters Niagara is 200,000 cubic feet a second. In its upper course the river is quite wide, below Grand Island its width being from two and one-half to three miles. Just above Niagara Falls it is less than a mile in width and below the falls it rushes headlong through a deep and narrow gorge to a cliff at Lewiston, where it emerges on the plain of Lake Ontario and is again a broad and peaceful river. As it emerges from Lake Erie and enters the plain, it is crossed by a low ridge of rock in passing which the river is swift and troubled for about two miles. Then it is smooth again. It flows slowly over the plateau, has an average depth of twenty-five feet and its surface is interspersed with small islands. For nearly three-fourths of its length it cannot be said to have a valley for it flows upon the surface of the plateau and its fall from the lake to the rapids above the cataract is only twenty feet. Then a sudden and complete change in its aspect occurs. It is dropped fifty-two feet by the short rapids beginning a little above Goat Island, which is the prelude of the fall over the majestic Cataract about half a mile above the brink of the falls. Goat Island divides the river into two streams. The one on the American side discharges over the American Falls while the most of the river's waters around to the left of Goat Island and discharges over the Horseshoe or Canadian falls.

The American falls are 1,070 feet wide and as the water plunges over the edge it falls 167 feet. The Horseshoe Falls have a total width 3,010 feet measured along the curve or 1,230 feet across the chord, and fall one hundred fifty eight feet. As the water is drained from the immense reservoirs of the lakes, there is little variation in the quantity, the differences in volume depending not so much upon precipitation as upon the strong winds which slightly retard or accelerate the movement of the surface waters at Lake Erie to the mouth of the river. The normal flow pouring over the cataract is about 500,000 tons a minute. At the foot of the American Falls there is no great depth of water massive and broken rock in the bed having prevented the deep excavation that would otherwise occur; but the enormous mass of water, some twenty feet deep at the center which thunders over the Horseshoe Falls has excavated a basin extending from shore to shore for one and one-half miles below the falls that is fully as deep as the height of the falls. The effect of this deep basin or reservoir is to retard and smooth the water so far that rowboats cross the river and the little steamer "Mid of the Mist" is able to approach the cataract. The basin is succeeded by the narrow gorge which continues to Lewiston, its width rarely equalling one-fourth of a mile, and its depth to the bottom of the river varying from two hundred to five hundred feet. Its walls are so steep that I can hardly climb up a little ways at a few places and I am "giving a dare devil" as some of the folks at Mt. Vernon know. But that is a little to much for me I don't possess the nerve. As I said they can only be climbed at a few places and they reveal the geologic structure of the plateau the bedded rocks of limestone shale and sand stone being almost horizontally placed. The fall of the river in the gorge, seven miles long is about one hundred

feet. The fall of water pours tumultuously along at an estimated speed of thirty miles an hour and the terrific rush of a million of the waters make a spectacle that is equal to that of the falls themselves. About midway in the gorge the channel makes an abrupt, sharp turn to the left and here the onslaught of the torrent has worn out a vast circular basin forming the celebrated whirlpool. The falls of Niagara being one of the scenic attractions of the world are visited every year by many thousands of tourists. From the time of their discovery by Hennepin in 1678 to the present day, they have never been adequately described. A realising sense of the grandeur of this production of nature pouring into an abyss where it is half lost in the masses of ascending mist can be obtained only by personal observation. From what I have seen and heard tourists say I think I could write twenty or more pages but think mine will do. Hoping the Editor will print this in the SIGNAL, and asking all to excuse many mistakes, I am still a friend to old Mt. Vernon.

The Republican nominee for Circuit Judge needs no introduction from the Herald. He came in our midst three years ago, a comparison stranger, and the fact that he had received such signal honors is

a powerful testimonial of the esteem in which he is now held. The quiet and modest man by sheer force of his intellect and personality, found a place in our affections and became a leader. The people know character, ability, courage and manhood when they see it.

This is pre-eminently the age of the young man. The grid of responsibility and endless detail, requires virility and intense nervous energy. The complexities of government, and the vast movements of our social order, must have unwasted strength and the unwasted youth. The unanimous elevation of Mr. Bethuram to the judiciary is a striking example of the new demands of public service, in which efficiency is the thing sought.

The nominee is barely thirty five just old enough to be within the constitutional limit. But in this day when the young man is the captain of industry, the leader in finance, the monitor of public thought, and the director of government, the pertinent question is, "What can you do?" "What are you willing to do?" and "Can you make good?"

Although the public career of Mr. Bethuram has been crowded into the brief period of ten years, it has been brilliant and fruitful. Nominations for three high offices have come to him without opposition. During the memorial and caucus session of the Legislature in 1906 he represented the good old counties of Laurel and Rockcastle, and was the minority leader. The future life of the party in Kentucky seemed uncertain, and the old leaders were abandoning it like a sinking derelict in the storm of passion and hate.

But counselling courage, firmness, and moderation the young leader stood.

"Among the innumerable false, unproved, unshaken, unadvised, untried."

When Mr. Sharp resigned as Commonwealth's Attorney for this district Governor Wilson commissioned Mr. Bethuram as his successor. With wonderful elasticity he took up the trying duties of this office, and soon proved a resourceful, able and courageous prosecutor.

Crime never passed him unchallenged, and sin never stood in his presence unrebuked. In appreciation of these services, the Republican party by common consent gave him a nomination for the office, and the people accorded him a sweeping victory at the polls last November.

The action of the District Committee, in convention Monday, must be a source of profound gratification to Mr. Bethuram. There were older men who were proud to be mentioned in connection with this honor, but his superior qualifications made opposition not only useless but ridiculous. The people will expect much of you Judge Bethuram, and we confidently believe that you will measure up to expectations.

Judge H. C. Faulkner has sent in his resignation as Circuit Judge of this District to Gov. Wilson. It is said that the Judge has an opportunity to form a partnership in a business that he cannot afford to pass up until his term of office has expired. His strong instructions to the grand jurors, and his personal opposition, backed by the citizens composing the petit jury, assisted by an able commonwealth attorney Judge Faulkner has practically eliminated the moonshine bootleggers in the 27th Judicial District. For this he deserves credit. Eliminate his penchant for speech, and the advantage he would take to call down a member of the bar, as well as setting aside the verdicts of the jury in trivial cases, he has made a good judge, and he will leave the bench with the respect and best wishes of a great majority of our people.—London Democrat.

In the Corporation Court at Rookoak, Va., Judge Staples set aside the local option election held there on December 30, last, in which the saloons were voted out by a majority of eighty-six votes.
