## POLITICS AND POLITICIANS

Judge H. Cook Faulkner, of Barbourville, will locate at Williamsburg as soon as his resignation as circuit judge can be accepted and his successor appointed.

The House Committee on Ways and Means at a full meeting decided to amend the Payne tariff bill by removing the duty on tea and the countervailing duty on coffee.

It is reported in Washington that the name of former Vice

President Chas. W. Fairbanks, of Indiana, is being considered at the White House for appointment as ambassador to the Court of St. James.

James W. Stone, Game Warden of Wisconsin, admitted to the Senatorial Primary Investigating Committee that he lied in his previous testimony before that body. He corrected his statement and gave some startling figures as to campaign funds collected from the game wardens.

The Democratic State Central Committee was in session at Lexington, Ten members voted in the proceedings. Thomas A. Combs, of Lexington, was elected campaign chairman and Lexington was selected as permanent campaign headquarters. Mr. Combs was also appointed chairman of a subcommittee, with the power to select six other members who will in the present hear all the contests in the Democratic party in the State.

"Ever see animals in captivity asleep?" asked the attendant at the Bronx Zoo the other day of a New York Times reporter. After dark the two walked to the deer ranges where soft-eyed creatures lazily nuzzled the remnants of their dinners; past dens of wolves and foxes, where the former were pacing back and forth and snarling at one another; past ponds of ducks and others and beavers to the dens of the bears blasted out of the side of the rocky ledge. There they stopped and the attendant pointed to a big black hulk being swallowed up by the falling darkness. There was just light enough to make out that the feet of the animal were tucked under a humped body and that its drooping head was trying to emulate the paw.

"He's been snoring like a steam engine since 5 o'clock," said the attendant, "and he won't wake up until morning. He's early to bed and late to rise. When the wolves howl, as they do several times at night, he's the only fellow in the zoo who isn't disturbed. He just keeps on snoring, does

this Kodiak bear from Alaska." An hour later all but two of the bears were in sound slumber. The hairy eared bear from Asia dozed as he squatted on his haunches and propped himself on his paws. The crotches of the dead trees were occupied by black bears curled up in balls. Cinnamon, brown and grizzly bears were scattered over the rocky floors.

There was one wide awake grizzly. He squatted before the light of his den and persistently endeavored to pick the lock. Half an hour later he stopped and went to sleep with his paws on the gate.

Not a sound came from the primate's house until the door was opened with a creak. Then every single living thing in there was very much alive, scampering about and chattering. The hay in the cage rattled; the sides of the cages shook as the monkeys swung up and down, and the snakes and perches squeaked under them. Pretty soon they settled down and all were soon asleep again. The little squirrel monkey, which was a tall four times the length of its body, was hanging to a perch and his tail was sticking straight up in the air. Other monkeys lying on their stomachs and with their hands under their chins reminded me of the way human babies frequently sleep.

A big black ape was humped up on the floor with his head leaning against the side of the cage and snored away like "a major." Two of the lions and maddrills from West Africa sat up like toy soldiers and with their hands under their chins looked the picture of content. The lions were found sleeping in a dozen ways, either on their sides with their feet out straight or on their stomachs with their heads resting between their paws. Two of the tigers had rolled over on their backs and their feet pointed toward the roof of the cage, while their tongues stuck out from their partly opened jaws. The puma was lying on his stomach sound asleep with his head twisted around so that the back of the head rested on the floor and seemed to be perfectly content.

The elephants had thrown themselves on their sides and lay as still as mice. Elephants sleep only when they think their keeper is not around. Let him appear and they will stand and lazily swing

their trunks in circles as long as he is in sight. Once he has vanished they lose no time in getting back to sleep.

The attendant said the wolves howled about every hour in the night. When they were not howling the wolves lay on their sides dog fashion and slept lightly. The foxes in the nearby dens, however, were just the opposite; they seemed to sleep hard despite their well known prowling propensities when at large. The howling of the wolves did not appear to faze them. As a matter of fact, according to old hunters, the fox is a very sound sleeper since he makes up his mind to it.

 Mrs. Martha Baker, of this county, Monday received a telephone message from the Superintendent of the Western Insane Asylum at Hopkinsville, announcing the death of Stephen Baker, a patient in that institution, asking disposition of remains. Mrs. Baker's husband, whose name is Isaac Baker (not Stephen) was sent to Lexington 13 years ago. The Hopkinsville Superintendent said Baker (Stephen) was transferred from Lexington to Hopkinsville. 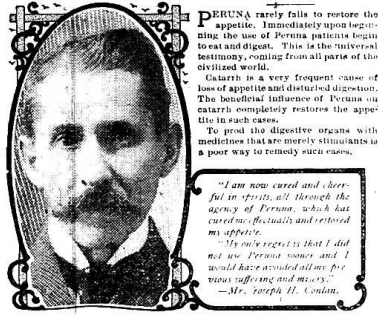
