Tobacco raised in the green houses at the Kentucky Experiment Station at State University Lexington, and representing plants which have been growing during the winter has just been cut. The plants were set out in the greenhouse last fall for the purpose of experimenting burley tobacco growth of different kinds of soil brought from various parts of the State and recently reached the stage where it was ready to be cut and house exactly as is done with the ordinary crop in August and early September. The quality of this winter crop is exceptionally good, all of the soils used having produced well, although there are of course variations which will be pointed out in the experiment station's reports when the tobacco has been cured and tested.
