Names of men were found in half a dozen large cities through a raid by federal detectives on headquarters for an active gang of burglars.

Six conspirators were placed under arrest at Indianapolis, Ind., and taken to Lima.

Lima had a roll of several hundred dollars on his person when arrested. Several hundred dollars have not been traced to him. He is held for an attempt will be made to trace the money under arrest. The jail is closely guarded and the militia are ready for immediate action.

MISSOURI PACIFIC RAILWAY

Puts into Effect a Three-Cent Fare in Missouri—Supreme Court Issues Prohibition Writ.

Kansas City, Mo., June 9.—At 10:01 o'clock Wednesday morning the Missouri Pacific railway put into effect a three-cent fare in Missouri. WEDNESDAY, a mob of 75 masked and armed men overpowered John Bridges at Frankfort and took John Maxie and hanged him from the bridge that spans St. Clair St. across Kentucky river, directly under an electric light. Maxie had shot Bert Bowers, Su persistent of the Howe Circus. While walking through the lot from one tent to another Bowers saw the negro ripping the tent of the main show. He told him to stop, and went to get a policeman to arrest him. When he turned Maxie raised a revolver and fired on him four times, one bullet penetrating through the abdomen. The surgeons do not know yet whether the wound is fatal. Bowers is an Elk and is in the hands of the Elks in that city, and will be well cared for. Maxie was captured with much trouble and was placed in jail, where the mob got him.

We do not ordinarily indorse mob law, but in this case we do. When the time comes that a man can't protect his own property, when trying to do so in a gentlemanly, without being shot in the back by a mean negro, then we say hang him to the first tree. For our part we want to congratulate those Frankfort citizens who did the good deed of relieving the community of such a low-down wretch.

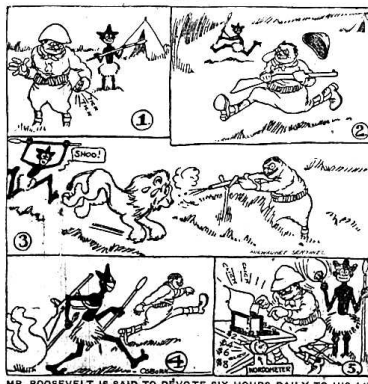

FEUDIST IS SHOT AS RESULT OF CHURCH WAR

Former Kentucky Sheriff Fatally Wounded in His Store—Said He Had Fared for Life.

JACKSON, Ky., June 8.—Ex-Sheriff Edward Callahan, famous throughout this section of the state for the part he played in the numerous feuds that have animated Breathitt county for years, was shot from ambush and is believed, fatally, wounded, at his home in Crookettsville, 34 miles from Jackson.

Callahan had swept out his store preparatory to opening for the day and was brushing the refuse from the front door when the shot was fired from ambush. The ball took effect in the left side of his abdomen. Blood-hounds have been put on the trail of the assassin. Callahan recently told friends that he expected to be attacked.

and killed by his son, Bosch Hargis, the latter having received a life sentence in the penitentiary for the murder.

Later developments regarding the shooting are that at least two assassins and probably more were engaged in the conspiracy to wipe out the Callahan family. At the same time the elder Callahan was being fired upon, another party, or a number of them, attacked his son, Wilson Callahan. A bullet fired by the unseen enemy plowed its way through his hair and carried his hat 20 feet away.

It is reported that the immediate cause of the shooting of ex-Sheriff Callahan was a dispute over the management of a church he built, and of which he had deacon, at Crookettsville.

Ex-President's Party Leaves Kijaba for Sotik Dis-Tri-Travel Day and Night.

Kijaba, British East Africa, June 7.—The Roosevelt expedition left here for the Sotik district. Between Kijaba and the objective there is a waterless tract that it will take two days and a half to traverse. Water for the expedition was carried in ox wagons in charge of a Ukato settler. The dust at present is fall and the nights are bright; this will enable the party to travel day and night with scarcely a stop until water on the other side is reached.

SLAIN IN COURTHOUSE.

Political Enmity in St. Louis Leads to Daring Tragedy as Trial Begins.

St. Louis, June 8.—Fred Mohrie, who killed Constable Sam Young in North St. Louis several weeks ago, was assassinated in the corridor of the criminal court building by William Kane, a former deputy under Young.

The shooting occurred as Mohrie was being taken to court to stand trial for the death of Young and is the culmination of a bitter political feud. Kane used Young's revolver on Mohrie.

\$50,000 Fire in Decatur. Decatur, Ill., June 8.—In a fire which started shortly after one o'clock this morning, from electric wiring on the sixth floor of the mill of the Decatur Capital Company, the entire plant was destroyed with a loss of \$50,000, with \$18,000 insurance. John Steeby, a fireman, was killed.

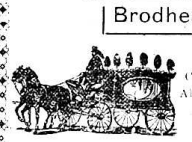

FIRE DESTROYS 100 HOMES

Proague Isle, Me., Is Swept by Flamer Which Causes Loss of \$300,000.

Proague Isle, Me., June 8.—The village northwesterly section of this village, comprising the district where were situated the most pretentious residences, was swept by fire last night, a high wind carrying flames and embers from street to street and all 100 dwelling houses and the Congregational church, the Masonic hall and several other structures had been reduced to ashes.

The Canadian Pacific railroad station and two large storehouses for potatoes were burned. The total loss is estimated at \$200,000.

Masked Men in Daring Robbery. Butte, Mont., June 8.—Two masked and masked men blew open a safe in a saloon in Anaconda Hall in the center of Butte, seized \$500 in cash and galloped away. Although seen by a number of citizens, the robbers escaped.

Shows New York's Growth. New York, June 7.—How New York city grows is shown in the returns of travel on the subway and elevated lines for 1907 and 1908. The sales of tickets in the subway increased from \$22,555,959 in 1907 to \$29,991,412 in 1908.

Offers England a Dreadnought. Melbourne, Australia, June 7.—At Fred Deakin, premier of the commonwealth, has sent the cablegram formally offering to the imperial government a loan of \$1,000,000 for a corresponding contribution to the navy.
