Mr. R. D. Sower, 43 a son of Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Sower of Level Green, died in Lexington asylum last Saturday and was brought here Sunday afternoon and taken to Level Green where his remains were laid to rest Monday morning.

Mr. Sower was at one time a well to do business man in one of the southern states, and while in business there, was one night attacked by a band of thieves, and robbed. He was struck on the head and rendered so completely unconscious that it was a long time before he regained consciousness and several months before he showed much improvement. He finally recovered, as it was thought at the several years run his business apparently alright. A little more than a year ago, he began to show signs of insanity, pronounced by the physicians to be the result of the injury received years ago. His condition rapidly grew worse and less than a year ago he was sent to the asylum, where he remained until his death. He was a member of Somerset Lodge L. O. O. F. and when at home was a splendid business man and good citizen. His body was laid to rest in Old Mt. Pleasant buying ground less than two hundred yards from the spot where he was born forty three years ago.

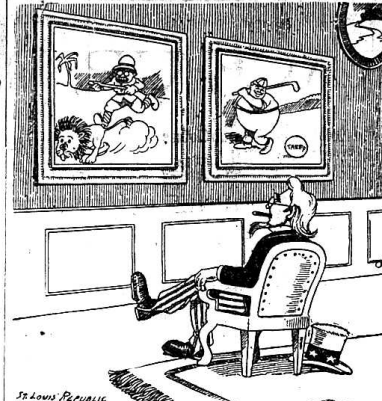

"Among thoughtful educationists there has been, for many years, a growing dissatisfaction with Kentucky's common school system. In together's associations, in county institutes and through the public press they have voiced their dissatisfaction and pointed to something better. The County Superintendent, in a large measure, reflect the educational sentiment of the commonwealth. They visit the schools, are familiar with the system under which they are operated, study our own educational institutions and compare them with the more progressive and efficient systems of other States. In the biennial reports, which have been issued from the office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, nearly all the County Superintendents have for the last ten years expressed their discontent with the old system and have argued the County Board system."

"That this wide spread dissatisfaction is not without cause, every intelligent observer of the workings of our system will bear witness. Among the glaring evils of the old school system, or rather the lack of any system was:

"About one-eighth of Kentucky's entire population were school trustees. There were about 25,000 in all. Very many were honorable and competent men. But in the selection of so many officers it was impossible that all or even a

majority, should be men qualified for the sacred and important trust which the law imposed upon them. There were on an average, about two hundred trustees for each county in the Commonwealth."

"The political unit of the South is the county. None other is recognized. All of the Southern States except Arkansas, have abolished the district system and substituted therefor the County System."

One of the most fruitful causes of graft in politics is the cost that has become necessary to land a good place. The Frankfort News says on this subject: "We heard a man say the other day that he would have to spend \$5000 to have even a chance for an office for which he was a candidate. He also said that his opponent could spend \$3000 and not miss it and would do so rather than be defeated. So the poor man withdrew from the race. Surely that is not right. This country, where it is our best, has men are equal certainly should give every man a chance regardless of his wealth. Office should not go to the man who can spend the most money, and it should not be necessary for a man to spend more than the office is worth in order to get it. That is what makes graft, this spending of large sums for to get small offices. The man who has an office four years, which during that time, will pay him \$10,000 and who has paid out \$5000 to get the place, feels that he ought to have some return for his money. That is why we have the grafters. They are simply trying to catch even. It should be so that every man according to his ability has the same chance as any other man to be elected to office regardless of how much money either candidate has. Otherwise we will soon reach a point where only the rich or a grafter can hold office."

SUES FOR LOST HAIR

COURT REFUSES TO QUASH WOMAN'S ACTION FOR \$20,000 DAMAGES.

CAUSE SUFFICIENT, HE SAYS

Attorney for the Fair Plaintiff, Argues That Trustee Are Feminine Beauty Asset and Judge Quashes of Milwaukee Appeal.

Milwaukee, June 8.—Judge Quarles has established in jurisprudence a principle in law that anything which tends to lessen the dazzling beauty of woman has laid itself open to the bitterest condemnation of all men and to liability for damages.

A woman who had a perfectly good cause for complaint in an action for damages if she loses her hair by reason of the application of chemicals, particularly so if the action is advertised as being a hair restorer.

Overrules the Damouran. Judge Quarles has overruled the demurrer of a company of Food and Fac to be complaint of Mrs. M. L. Bowman to the effect that her complaint does not state a sufficient cause of action. He gave the defendants time to file their answer.

Mrs. Bowman, a traveling woman, used the drug company and a St. Louis manufacturer of hair dye for \$10,000 damages for the loss of her hair. She alleges its loss was caused by the application of hair stain purchased from the drug company and manufactured by the St. Louis company. The defendants demurred on the ground that which cannot entitle her to state a sufficient cause of action.

Hair, Mr. Chief Beatty, said the attorney for Mrs. Bowman, while arguing the case. "To purchase a well-known preparation, the woman who loses her hair is usually—she who loses her hair takes that which cannot entitle him and leaves her poor indeed. A woman's hair, is one of her chief assets. That hair ought to be so well preserved, edged that women nowadays are not content with nature's gifts, but purchase large quantities of bogus preparations in order to increase their assets."
