RANK FAILURE.

REPUBLICAN ADMINISTRATION
TRYING HARD TO EXPLAIN
AWAY INCOMPETENCY.—
STATE JOURNAL EX-
POSES FALLACY.

(State Journal.)

In a recent published statement, Capt. Farley, the State Treasurer, says:

"We have struggled hard to avoid expense of having an extra session of the Legislature to provide for the deficit inherited from our predecessors and feel confident the good people of the State approve our course."

Will our good friend, the Treasurer, please explain what deficit he and his associates inherited from their predecessors of the Democratic administration?

Has he devised some new system of accounting or mathematics by which he can prove that a substantial balance in the treasury is a deficit, or has he become a wizard in lexicography and changed the meaning of the word deficit? Does he hope by skillful or magic arrangement of figures to make the people believe that there was a deficit in the State Treasury when he took charge of it? Surely not. Every one who has given the matter any attention knows that instead of a deficit there was at that time a good working balance

in the treasury ample to carry on the State Government under unobscured and intelligent management.

This recent statement is not so good even with the published statement of Auditor James some time ago.

The trouble with the members of the present Republican administration is that they are constantly bothered with the question coming from the lips of everyone: "Why isn't that the Democratic Administration with less revenue in their eight years, promptly met every demand upon the State treasury, paid off the State debt, built the new Capitol, increased the school term, made so many other improvements, and in January, 1908, turned over to their successors \$1,100,000, and the Republican administration in eighteen months with greater revenue have dissipated that sum, closed the doors of the treasury against the payment of claims against the Commonwealth, made no improvements and have nothing to show to the people creditable to the stewardship of this administration?" They are unable to make as good a showing, even as that servant in the parable who buried the talent entrusted to him and returned it without increment to his master.

It is idle for them to claim that when the democratic administration turned over the \$1,100,000 to them it also left a large amount of unpaid claims. That administration up to the last paid every claim in its due and regular order, and if we are not mistaken it paid out just a few days before it went out of office, about \$300,000. It could have left that unpaid for a while longer if it had been trying to make a big showing of figures. It left the \$1,100,000 not with any guaranty that it would remain there, but as a sufficient sum to carry on the State's business, for it had with less money under greater financial stress and difficulties done so and preserved the State's credit at the highest point.

The question is a hard one for them to answer or explain, but the people are doing a lot of talking about it and have answered it for themselves. As soon as they get a chance at the polls they will tell what their answer is. They have tried again

the costly experiment of Republican administration in this State and we greatly misjudge their intelligence if they do not at the first opportunity, remedy their mistake.

ELECT U. S. SENATORS BY POPULAR VOTE.

Twenty-seven States have through their Legislature declared in favor of an amendment to the constitution providing for the election of United States Senators by direct vote of the people. Only five States are necessary now to propose an amendment which ought to be easily obtained under the prevailing sentiment in regard to the Senate, the majority of which acts in utter disregard of the people in favor of classes. If the present Senate is waded out, and all the Senators who had procured their seats by fraud excluded, there would hardly be a corporal's guard left. There is every reason that the Senators should be elected by the people and now that we know of why they should not. The constitution provides that two-thirds of the State acting together can propose amendments, which, when submitted, requires the ratification of three-fourths of the States asking through their Legislatures or conventions. The Senators, as a rule, are violently opposed to the innovation, but the House, we believe has no more than one occasion expressed itself in favor of it. The will of the people is often thwarted by the Legislatures in the selection of United States Senators in Kentucky, especially, we have no shame and sorrow on more than one occasion been the most flagrant disregard of party obligation and popular demand. The election of Senators by the vote of the people is coming, but it will be delayed as long as possible by the millionaires of the Senate, who can buy the Legislatures, but not the majority of the great common people.

NEWS ITEMS The standing army of the United States is to be increased 1,000 men. John G. A. Lelshman, the new American Ambassador to Italy, was received by King Victor Emmanuel. It is believed the tariff bill will be passed by the Senate and sent to conference by the end of the week.

It is reported that Gen. Louis Botha, Premier of the Transvaal will offer the chartered South Africa company \$100,000,000 for Rhodesia. Citizens of the United States bought \$10,000,000 more in diamonds and other precious stones during the fiscal year of 1909 than the year previous.

Cardinal Gibbons was the principal speaker at the opening of the celebration commemorating the three hundredth anniversary of the discovery of Lake Champlain. Speyor & Co., announce they have arranged for the sale of a \$10,000,000 issue of St. Louis and San Francisco Railroad Company's fifteen to twenty year 5 per cent. gold bonds to a syndicate of French bankers. Coming into contact with a live wire near his home at New Orleans Andrew Brown, 12 years old, is still alive after a electric current of 3,300 volts hit passed through his body. He was badly burned, but physicians think he will recover.
