The health of a town or any family in town or country depends largely on the cleanliness of streets, premises and water supply.

Typhoid fever is known to be caused by germs of bacteria, that exist and are propagated in pure water, and other substances that are filthy.

Every town should have a board of health, and some one competent to examine at intervals the back yards, barn yards and water closets in the incorporated limits, and report the sanitary conditions as a menace to good health.

It should be the pride of citizens and merchants to have premises inspected and vie with each other as to the neatness, cleanliness, and sanitary condition of streets and front and back yards.

The streets and sidewalks of a town belong to everybody in town or out of town, to use in walking, riding or driving but for no other purpose.

It is therefore the duty, of every citizen to not encumber streets, or sidewalks with boxes, benches, steps, or lumber, or material of any kind, no longer than is absolutely necessary in building repairs etc. (Side note along the side walks are a comfort to the people living in town adding to the beauty and coolness so much needed in hot July and August weather. But when they are used for hitching places or teams when not in use they are no longer right to parties so using them.) No responsible person will object to having a horse hitched in front of store or residence for short time while attending to business, but when a place is so used for days and weeks in wet weather, or any kind of summer weather, flies are drawn to the locality, with accumulations and thus may become a nuisance. It should be the business of every citizen to be accommodating and helpful to each other in keeping the sidewalks and the street in front of one's premises neat, clean and attractive. Again let us be neighborly,

friendly, courteous in the matter of clean streets and sidewalks and sanitary back yards and water closets, for the good will, the good health, and accommodation of all. I. W. V. July 16, '09.

INVENTION OF LANTERNS.

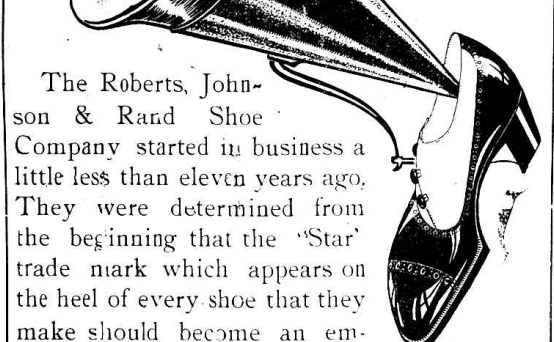

IN CAMPBOR FORESTS.

Formosa's campbor forests are big enough to supply the world for a hundred years, for the Japanese plant a new tree for every one that is cut down. In a campbor camp the air is thoroughly purified by the odor. The trees are cut into chips and fed into big retorts, heated by slow fires. The vapor passes off, and the material left consists of campbor crystals, which are refined before being placed for shipment, and a crude product from which campborated oil is made. A MEERSCHAUM PIPE. A BEAVER'S TAIL A TROWEL.

IT REQUIRES CAREFUL SMOKING TO COLOR IT PROPERLY.

Ordinarily a meerschaum pipe is boiled for coloring in a preparation of wax, which is absorbed and this coating of wax is held on the surface of the pipe and made to take a high polish. Under the wax is retained the oil of tobacco which is absorbed by the pipe, and its blue grows darker in proportion to the tobacco used. A meerschaum pipe at first should be smoked very slowly, and before a second bowl is lighted the pipe should be cooled off. This is to keep the wax as far up the bowl as possible, and rapid smoking will overheat, drying the wax off and leaving the pipe dry and raw—somersault journal.

Then there is the beaver, whose tail, I am convinced, is a trowel, says a writer in the Strand Magazine. I know of no naturalist who has mentioned this, but such a "negative" evidence is of little weight. The beaver, as everybody knows, is a builder that cuts down trees and piles log upon log until he has raised a solid, domed cabin from seven to twenty feet in diameter, which he then plasters over with clay and straw. If he does not turn around and beat the work smooth with his tail, then I require to know for what purpose he carries that broad, heavy and arched tail behind him.
