Messrs Logan Arnold, nominee for First district and Haring Moore for Third so far have made no reply. These gentlemen evidently do not consider the great question of road building in Rockcastle of such minor importance that a reply is unnecessary and have decided to rest the matter with indifference, or are they simply afraid to get themselves on record for or against roads, until after the November election? The voters of Rockcastle are waking up the importance of road building and since the Fiscal Court must be largely instrumental in giving the relief sought, we believe that the people are going to see to it that the men who compose the Fiscal Court for the next four years, are men who are alive to the needs of the county and men, who have enough nerve and backbone to come out and say what they will do before the election, instead

of saying nothing beforehand and doing nothing afterwards. The office of magistrate is an important office and should be filled by the best, most liberal-minded and enterprising citizens in the county. There is no politics in such an office and should not be.

The three gentlemen who have responded do very well so far as they go, but just say we want good roads and stop, doesn't signify very much. Gentlemen come out and say what you will do if elected.

Good people, now is the time to strike if we want any relief from mud holes and quagmires. Lay aside your politics for a few hours and work for the interest of your county. For our part we are slightly against any man for any office who is not a "Good Road" advocate, and who will not speak out and pledge himself to do all that is possible for him to do for the benefit of our roads.

Let us all join in the fight for that which the county so badly needs—better roads.

The world was electrified Monday when the bridge was finished from the coast of Labrador that Lieut. Robert E. Peary had discovered the North Pole. Coming five days after the startling announcement by Dr. F. A. Cook, of Brooklyn, that he had accomplished the same feat, it was truly sensational. Peary and several members of his party confirmed the news, during Monday. No detailed report of Peary's achievement was received last night, but to-morrow the doughty commander promises to let the world know how he accomplished the daring discovery on April 6th, 1909. Dr. Cook, who claims he spanned the covered "top of the earth" on April 4, 1909, is still the cynosure of all eyes at Copenhagen, Denmark. He has gained further recognition in the world of science, since his first story was given to the world from Lerwick, Shetland Islands.

NEW HIGH BRIDGE

The actual construction of the new High Bridge is now under way and something like one hundred men are at work grading and concreting under the old bridge over the Kentucky river on the Cincinnati Southern railway. The contract for the new structure was let to the American Bridge Company. The length of the new bridge will be 1,140 feet, and the height 317, thirty-one feet higher than the old one. It will be built for a double track, but only one track will be used for the present. The building of the bridge will not interfere with traffic in any way and it will be built directly over the old one.

The old bridge cost \$494,373 and the new one will cost nearly a million or twice the amount of the old one. There are 2,654,280 pounds of iron in the old bridge and 12,935 cubic feet of masonry. The new bridge will take 15,000 cubic feet of masonry. It will cost about one year to complete the work. The new bridge will be strong enough to hold the largest type of engines on the road.

The following clipped from Bluefield, West Virginia Telegraph speaks of a native of Rockcastle county who about the year 1887 was working in furniture factory in Mt. Vernon fifty cents a day: "A message from Los Angeles, Cal., yesterday confirmed the sale of the R. G. Walters Ranch, containing 727 acres, to William Hicks and others, of this city. Mr. Hicks has purchased in San Jacinto, Riverside county, California, one of the famous Estadio ranch which he disposed of last winter at \$110 per acre, the owners have realized on the first crop more than they paid per acre."

Mr. Vernon business men, have you read P. H. Shuttlesworth letter and how much do you want a piece? It is up to Mt. Vernon to take the lead and the farmers are looking to us for the necessary assistance. Business men do you want to help your town, increase your business and benefit the county? If so join in the effort to build this piece of sample road; the citizens along the proposed route subscribe one half of the required amount to construct the road, the Fiscal Court must supply the remaining half. The farmers are contributing liberally and if this movement proves failure, Mt. Vernon will be responsible. The necessary amount to raise by subscription \$14,500. There has already been subscribed \$1,700 by farmers living along the route and we have assurance that this amount can be increased to \$2,500 outside the town leaving \$2,300 the amount Mt. Vernon must raise to reach the coveted end. If Mt. Vernon does its part we will have six miles of model pipe, and if not the movement will prove a failure. If our business men will contribute, according to their means and in proportion to the benefits they will receive, it will be an easy matter to raise the required amount. Will we accept or reject?

Well, well! It seems as though I have gotten a load on 'my shoulders, as people say the burden of building a pile road from Mt. Vernon to Brom is on me, as I recently wrote an article on that subject. But, as I said, if my writing had any influence I would come again. Now, my plain is to raise a subscription list along said route and in Mt. Vernon, showing to the Fiscal Court how much we want good roads, and ask them to lend us a helping hand. This piece of road should be a sample to the people of Rockcastle and show to them that we can have some good roads as well as other counties. The people throughout the state, even the large cities and Bluegrass counties, are taking more interest in our welfare by proposing to give us that state aid in building our highways, than we are ourselves, but they won't help us unless we are willing to receive it.

The route proposed would follow pretty closely to the old Mt. Vernon and Casey county road, only leaving it when we can't get a good grade by following it. I do not hardly know how many people would be directly benefited by building such a road. Beginning at Mt. Vernon by way of Tunnel No. 1, it would intersect with the old Somerset road, giving the people of that section of country a mile of good road in going to town, they going by way of Mt. Geo. Lewney to Oneida; these we intersect the next county, from all that good farming country about Mareburg, they pass over gap of hill by way of Will Owens. Then we head road leading into the Somerset road, then on the road from our church to foot of Noe hill, we have the State's crime going to Webb, then over gap of hill and through valley to Dec. Hereafter, there we have road leading to Chas and Sec. Lock then north to Brown, which would give all the people of Level Green and the southwestern part of the county a good road to the county seat. Now, Mt. Vernon people, you want the trade of all these people, and do want to assist in your town? If you do, show us how
