Several years ago a prominent citizen of Mt. Vernon thought that he should not liquor through the entire election day and did not know that it was against the law to do so. We give the gentleman the benefit of the doubt and say that we do not believe he would have done so had he known the law forbade it. The law is frequently violated through ignorance of it, but ignorance excuses no one from punishment. Two things most frequently lead the people to break the law. One is indifference and negligence, and the other is the want of knowledge as to what the law requires.

The SIGNAL, being interested in building up of our district schools, is determined that no trustee can say "I did not know that the law required me to do that." Read the SIGNAL, read it all and you will find many things worthy of your attention and here are a few things required of the trustees of public schools. Be sure attend the county Institute; see that the children go to school or that they have a mighty good excuse for staying away; visit the parents and urge upon them the importance of taking an interest in all things pertaining to the school and school property; report the parents who have not a good excuse for not sending their children to school; recommend to the Division Board improvements in the school house and grounds; see that the Division

Board refers such reports to the county board of education with a proper recommendation. When trustees do their full duty toward obtaining the very best teachers, the very best school houses and beautiful grounds, requiring all the time the children to attend school regularly, the great cause of education will advance rapidly.

LOGAN Arnold, Republican nominee for Magistrate in the First District, and Hardin Moore, the Republican nominee in the Third District, have failed to take any notice whatever of our communication asking them if they would vote, in their official capacity, for the building up and improving of our county roads. Their failure to answer means that they are opposing the building up of our county roads and highways which is so necessary for the success of farmers. It means that they would vote, as magistrates, against any movement looking toward modernizing our roads. It means that they are afraid to express themselves either for or against such a proposition. If they are afraid to express themselves now, they would be afraid to advocate any measure for the benefit of the roads after they are elected. There's the man who kicks at the overtime charge of his message, and the man who claims that he paid his bill in advance last month, but was somehow mislaid the receipt. There's the lady who won't pay until she gets one of those nice little telephones like Mr. Jones, across the street, has got, and the lady who didn't know it cost extra to talk long distance, and the lady who wants a reduction in her bill because her aunt got in Hazardous County, South Dakota, saying that she got her telephone for seventy-five cents a month—she

Once upon a time I knew a man to refuse to pay for a message because he had called a merchant in another town, and told him to send down a case of eggs on the afternoon train—and the eggs didn't come. The eye on the right shows this defect in vision corrected by a concave lens, throwing the light back to the retina, forming perfect vision.
