## PARK FOR MT. VERNON.

The people of Mt. Vernon and vicinity seem to be anxious to have a park made where the old section house in Mt. Vernon, now stands. This old house has been standing for more than one hundred years. No living man remembers when it was new. This ancient land mark, hoary with age, has seen generation after generation, come and go. It is an "eye sore" to the people of Mt. Vernon.

The Board of Trustees of the Town of Mt. Vernon, has requested the Louisville & Nashville Railroad Company to tear down this old house and establish a park where it now stands. The Board has made an official request asking the Company to grant this boon to our town. The Company has made parks at many other places along the line of road between Knoxville and Louisville. There are nice parks at South Louisville, Lebanon Junction, Crab Orchard, Livingston, London and at many other points.

The Railroad Company is now building a new depot at this place of which our people will be proud. The only thing that will mar the beauty of the new depot, will be the old section house that overshadows it on the South. The people of our town need a park. The spirit of lethargy is departing from our people, and the spirit of industry and prosperity is taking hold of us.

We now have a thriving little city. Brown Memorial School, with its 125 pupils is located here; we have a good dormitory that accommodates many a girl; we have a public school, well attended. The Board of Education of Rockcastle County has just decided to erect a High School at a cost of \$15,000; we have a valuable rock crusher plant here that furnishes ballast daily to the railroad company, and to towns along the Louisville & Nashville line of road. We have a fine plant, a successful flouring mill, planing mill and other improvements. Large quantities of lumber, staves, spokes, tan-bark, &c., are shipped from this place each year. This park would add small amount of beauty to our town, and comfort and pleasure to our people. We stand ready to take our hats off to the L. & N. the day it orders a park to take the place of this ancient structure. We and the people of Mt. Vernon and vicinity, heartily join with the Town Board of Trustees, in asking the Company to establish this park. So mote it be.

## MT. VERNON SIGNAL

It is certainly a cause for rejoicing to the progressive citizens of Rockcastle county and for congratulation to the SIGNAL man, that the initiative for improvement of roads, streets and sidewalks has been begun, in the columns of the SIGNAL and by agitation and discussion by the people in town and county.

In the matter of good roads it goes as a self evident truth needing no argument, to prove it that the material prosperity of any place depends on its facilities for transportation. Every town or city of importance, owes its prosperity to transportation by water, or by virtue of its being a rail-road center. A town on a branch of a trunk line becomes nothing more than a way station, if the roads leading to it, are not such that large loads can be quickly and easily moved to it.

With a good road between Mt. Vernon to Langford, the distance between Cincinnati and Mt. Vernon can be shortened three hours. Mt. Vernon with added facilities of fifty miles of "trickle" would have her real estate enhanced an average 25 per cent. more. Mt.

Vernon should be the center, commercially, and educationally of not less than Sixty Four Square miles, yes twice that number.

It is in the midst, of a district rich in Agricultural and mineral resources that needs only the good roads and a degree of enterprise that they will bring, to develop the most prosperous community in the mountains of Ky. Its coal, timber, agricultural and other mineral resources are shut out practically by reason of bad roads, difficult to drive or haul over in dry weather, and practically impossible for profitable transportation six months in every year. It is up to the voters to put up estimates based on a radius of eight miles from the court house in Mt. Vernon. Hence the building of thirty two miles, of road leading out eight miles in four directions would partially open up sixty four square, miles of territory a part of the resources of which remains practically untouched. This area is capable of maintaining a population five times as great as now live in it, and with double the amount per capita of taxable property, even with our present state of living, and estimates on property.

While we have no array of figures at hand to demonstrate this, we believe that this is only a very conservative estimate of the possibilities and capabilities, of the territory, and the people, present and prospective included.

In closing this article a word to the merchants, bankers, business and professional men of Mt. Vernon, will be in order. To you more than any other equal number in a town of country is this matter of improvement of chief importance. Every dollar expended by you in the enterprise under consideration will be an investment worth far more, returning dividends in the years to come, more than in what you have in Bank Stock, Merchandise and all other enterprises combined. Every dollar expended in building good roads remains at home, and comes right back into the bank, over the merchants counter through the doctors bank account to the farmer for his commodities, and teams furnished, and the good roads are ours, yours mine, a common property, a community enterprise, a thing of utility.

It will be only the entering wedge, and a promise of better things, of greater improvement, and lasting benefits, according to our homes and schools which after all is "The Paramount Issue." GOOD IDEA! It has been suggested that an Independent and Citizens Ticket be placed in the field from which to choose our municipal officers in November, a good idea. We notice from the Lexington papers that Dr. M. Pennington, of Bertha, took a prominent part in the meeting in that city on Sept. 29th, for the organization of a state anti-tuberculosis association. The object of the society, as stated in the articles of incorporation, is to carry on an educational campaign in which the details of the disease are made known and for the establishment of local associations all over the state. The name of the society is the Kentucky Association for the Prevention and Relief of Tuberculosis. The headquarters will probably be Louisville. Dr. Pennington has made a special study of the disease and there is no doctor in the state who is better posted thereon. He is the leader of the South Eastern Kentucky Association and a member of the New York State Association. He has been at work for past year looking to the establishment of a large sanitarium to be located in Knox, Bell or one of the adjoining counties. Dr. Pennington has had considerable experience and success in the treatment, prevention and care of this much dreaded disease. The proposed establishment of the sanitarium not only has the endorsement of the medical profession in that part of the state but has the backing of well known financial institutions and individuals who are willing to assist and anxious to see Dr. Pennington's enterprise carried out.


