In the race for town officers, J. F. Griffin won over Judge J. T. Adams and R. M. Johnson for Police Judge. George Ferguson, the present marshal was re-elected by a majority of 36 and the new board of trustees, composed of A. H. Hamlin, F. R. Asher, James Meadows, E. B. Cox and E. B. Brown, were elected by a good majority over the old board. The old board was composed of Jousa McKenzie, Dr. A. G. Lovell, R. B. Mullins, Fritz Krueger and D. C. Poynter.

The election has come and gone. In Rockcastle, the Democratic ticket made a splendid showing, all the candidates running ahead of their ticket, and nowhere losing by more than the ordinary majority. In the County Court Clerk's race, Mr. D. N. Williams made a great fight, making it a tie vote in the two Mt. Vernon precincts, which generally give from 160 to 160 Republican majority. He carried West Mt. Vernon, Broadhead and Brown, while Mr. Williams lost, he has nothing of which he can complain, the Democrats stood manly by him. Many republicans voted for him, speaking out publicly in loud praise of his fitness for the office. His sons, C. C., M. C. and R. G. Williams fought valiantly for his success.

W. H. Krueger has proven himself somewhat of a detective, as he has safely landed behind the bars the four negroes who broke into his store one week ago and took several hundred dollars worth of clothing. He followed them to Middleboro, their home and captured them, after doing some pretty wise detective work and they are now in the Mt. Vernon jail. The negroes tell the whole story and substantiate the work of the blood-hounds brought here from Houstonville.

The negroes say they went to the cut near Sparks Quarry and then caught a freight train for Crab Orchard and it was at this cut that the dog lost the trail and was never able to go any further. The clothing was packed in a trunk, the trunk also being taken from Krueger's store, and checked from Mt. Vernon to Crab Orchard and the following day the negroes went through to Middleboro. There is a band of these negro thieves, whom it is said have a large stock of clothing at Middleboro and that their goods have all been secured in this way. Some of them are reported to be worth as much as \$100,000. They have been doing this kind of work for five years but this is the first time they have been caught although people suspected such. The first negro brought here, connected with the offense, was at one time porter for the L. & N. on this line, but was injured and was then given a position in the depot at Middleboro, but later discharged because of thefts connected with baggage left at depot. We have no doubt but that this same crowd of negroes are the one who have been doing the stealing at Livingston, Broadhead, Withers and other points in the county along the railroad.

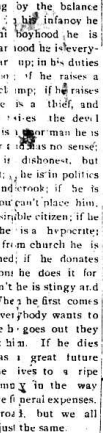

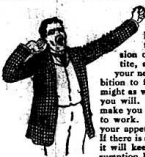

## ROCKCASTLE'S PROPOSED NEW HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING.

The above cut represents the new High School Building that has been accepted for Rockcastle County by the School Commissioners. The plans for this building provide for all necessary features as found in a well equipped modern High School building.

The basement will be used for heating apparatus consisting of two furnaces of the best make. Also there will be provided separate play rooms for the boys and girls, with toilets attached, ample fuel rooms and storage room, also a manual training room and domestic science room, with separate stairways for the boys and girls from the ground floor.

The first floor will consist of four extra large class rooms, principal's private office, teachers' rest room. Ten foot corridors will extend through the center of the building. Connecting with each class room will be an individual cloak room with one entrance from the corridor, giving the pupils opportunity to pass through the cloak room before they enter the class room.

The second floor will consist of two class rooms, with cloak rooms at

ached, janitor's room with stairway to the roof, a spacious library and a large auditorium to seat 250 people.

Everything in the makeup of the plans has been considered from a sanitary standpoint. The heating and ventilation have had particular study. Fresh air is provided for each class room separately from above, also from the outside of the building direct to the class room.

The elevation is of the most approved style of school architecture, making a very handsome structure when completed. A large portico ornaments the front of the building, which will have cement steps and large columns of the Doric order.

The roof will be flat, covered with tar and gravel—the most lasting that can be put on. The building will be built of red brick and limestone. The stone will be furnished by the mills of Rock Castle county. Plans and specifications can be seen by calling at County Superintendent's office.

Louisville and Jefferson went Democratic.

Head-elected Mayor of Louisville by about 5000.

Davis, independent, defeated Moss republican nominee for Judge of the 26th Judicial district.

Laurel county elected the Independent candidates for County Judge and Jailor.

Democrats carried Lincoln and Garrard counties by handsome majorities.

The elections held on Tuesday throughout the country show that Massachusetts and Rhode Island have re-elected Republican governors, while Virginia has returned a Democrat to this office.

New York City has elected the Democratic candidate, Judge William J. Bryan, to the office of mayor, while in Philadelphia the effort of the reformers to break the Republican organization was failed.

In New Jersey the Republicans held their own everywhere.

Tom L. Johnson, Democrat, has been defeated as mayor of Cleveland, Ohio.

The latest returns from San Francisco indicate that Francis J. Heney, Democrat, has been defeated for district attorney.

In Maryland the paramount issue was the so-called disfranchising amendment, designated to disfranchise the negro as a political factor. The

returns in this State came in slowly and the result is still uncertain. The indications are however, that the amendment has been defeated.

The Republicans carried Messa chusetts by the narrow margin in the history of the Bay State, for nearly a quarter of a century. The entire party ticket was re-elected, but Governor Draper's plurality was cut down from 60,000 last year to 5,000.

The Democratic victory in Virginia brings Judge Mann to the office of governor. His majority will be the usual one for the state.

New Jersey elected eight members of the state senate and a full house of sixty members of the general assembly. The Republicans will again control both houses.
