George Hastv, aged about 30 years died Wednesday at his home near Row Hill church after suffering six weeks with typhoid fever. He leaves a wife and five little children.

Important changes in the present school laws of Kentucky is to be presented at its next session. The new bill was prepared by the Kentucky Educational Commission and while the bill has not been completed a rough draft has been made. The bill replaces the present State Board of Education and provides for general supervision of finances and the preparation of examination questions. The State Superintendent of Public Instruction is given much larger powers. As to the county superintendents the bill still provides that they devote their whole time to their duties and their salaries are to be increased.

The following is a resolution adopted by the Grand Lodge of Kentucky masons, represented by Atty. J. W. Brown at the request of Dr. M. Pennington. The same resolution was offered by Dr. Pennington at the Grand Lodge 1. O. O. F. at Mayfield and adopted. The resolutions is as follows:—

WHEREAS, in the campaign of education concerning the cure and prevention of consumption, which the recently organized Kentucky Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis is about to begin throughout this State, where more than 6,000 unnecessarily die from this disease every year, therefore be it Resolved, That the Kentucky Association has the entire sympathy and moral support of this Grand Lodge and that we commend to every lodge this great humanitarian movement against the greatest single cause of death in our State, and that we urge all members of this Grand Lodge, and of our Order, to lend to the anti-tubercular fight their influence and co-operation.

LAND STOCK AND CROP.

Do not keep either the young or old horses stabled for several days in succession, because they need daily exercise for bone and muscle development.

In the eastern half of the United States black rot has proven a serious drawback to grape culture. Humidity is favorable to this disease. More than 20 years ago spraying was introduced as a means of combating this and other fungus diseases of vines and fruit trees, and Bordeaux mixture has been the standard fungicide from the first.

The earlier ground is plowed for fall wheat the better, as it allows more time for the soil to settle before seeding time. Soil in which wheat and all other grasses are sown must be worked down very fine and compact in order that a large per cent. of the seeds may germinate and the young plants make early and rapid growth.

Excitement and labor spent in this way will be rewarded in next season's crop. An excellent mixture to keep worms and other parasitic affection from the hogs is as follows: Six bushels of corn cob charcoal, eight pounds of common salt, two quarts of air slacked lime and a bushel of ashes. Thoroughly mix and then take one or two quarter pounds of copperas, dissolve it in hot water, and sprinkle the solution over the whole mass and again thoroughly mix. Place this solution in a wheelbarrow where hogs can reach it at pleasure.

Sunflower seed is good poultry food, and a few rows of the plants near the poultry yard are also good for summer shade and protection.

To keep the boy on the farm, enlist his interest, give him something that he can call his own, and let him have the profits realized from its sale.

The hog crop is admittedly small. Government estimates place the shortage at about 11 per cent. for this entire country and 15 to 17 per cent in the main hog producing states. Market experts generally consider that the corn belt will have but 25 per cent. less hogs to sell this year than last, says *Bread's Gazette*. Receipts for this year have been running far behind, with a shortage so far, at the six principal western markets, of 1,879,000 head, or 12 1/2 per cent compared with the same months last year. With the high prices that have prevailed for live hogs, consumption has been curtailed in a measure, but still there is only a very meagre supply of the hog product in store. Although hog prices have been and still are high compared with 'cattle, the prospect is that there will be nothing in the size of the marketward movement, or in the further shrinking in consumption to justify any great reduction in prices.

NEWS ITEMS

Representative W. F. Blair, of Lexington, denies it a report that he will be a candidate for speaker.

Negro hunters, who are smoking a rabbit from a hollow log, caused a costly forest fire in Christian county.

Nine persons were killed and nearly a score of men injured in an explosion and fire in the comb factory of Robert Morris & Son, on Columbia st., Brooklyn.

Canada Monday extended a warm welcome to representatives of organized labor who are attending the twenty-ninth annual convention of the American Federation of Labor at Toronto.

The fight which developed following the tie in the election for Circuit Court Judge between William Mc.D. Shaw, Republican and Frank Tracy, Democrat had another sensational feature added to it Monday. Tracy, who is a present County Attorney, filed a scathing affidavit of which he makes startling charges of fraud against Shaw, a Republican who is "higher up." Part of Tracy's sworn statement is as follows:

"Offences against the ballot, while frequent in the past in Kenton county, have never been punished, and there is a crying necessity that no one be made an offender of this class, and not merely perpetrators of criminal acts punished, but that men higher in the political and social scale who direct and set in motion the work of these active criminals be made to bear the responsibility for their acts."

In other parts of his affidavit, Tracy charges officers of the Kenton Circuit Court with fraud in the matter of drawing the present grand jury. He also charges that the Republican Campaign Committee, Republican oficals and the proprietors of a gang bing house, entered into an agreement that, in return for "insurance" alleged gamblers would support the Republican ticket.

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GOOD ROAD AMENDMENT.

The vote on the good roads amendment to the Constitution is a disappointment to those who are interested in the betterment of Kentucky's highways. A wonderful kick of interest has been shown in many localities of which better things have been expected. There seems to be a bare chance that the amendment has been adopted, but if such proves to be the case it will be by a close margin.

The small vote on the proposition in many counties and the adverse majority in others are due to popular indifference and to the widespread fear of "linking with the Constitution." Kentucky has a large number of voters who vote on general principles against any sort of a proposition to amend the Constitution. A still larger number declines to vote at all. It is these two elements of the electorate which makes it so difficult to adopt even so meritorious and desirable a measure as the Wyatt-Bosworth amendment.

Some of the wealthiest, most popular and most progressive counties of the State have voted overwhelmingly against the amendment. Some other counties, of which not so much was expected, have given the proposition a surprisingly good support. It is evident, however, that the advocates of good roads have much to do in the way of evangelization. There should be the amendment scope through, it is evident that a number of coun-

ties will be slow to take advantage of its provisions. There is a lack of interest in road improvement that is painful and discouraging to those who have sought to point the way to better conditions. The campaign of agitation, organization and education must be continued until every section of Kentucky is thoroughly awakened to the importance of good roads in the meantime; those counties which have recognized the necessity of improvement should not waver in well doing. Whenever the work of substantial betterment has been undertaken it should be kept up to the end that the best possible results may be secured with the means available.—Courier Journal.

In the various speeches which the President has made during his swing around the great circle he has left little doubt as to what his policy may be with reference to important political questions. He has said that he intends to recommend a good many measures to the next session of Congress. Not that he expects them all to be passed but he desires to shift the responsibility to legislative shoulders where it belongs. If the measures do not pass the public will know where to place the blame. Mr. Taft was elected as probably some millions still remember to carry out the policies of Theodore Roosevelt. The people of the country have not forgotten what those policies are and both the majority in Congress and the President of the United States are under obligation to make performance a fact. The President for a long time a member of the Roosevelt Cabinet and the only choice for the Roosevelt mantle, and his stick has said that he knows better than any other what those policies are. Since every intelligent man in America knows them well the President must be a remarkably well informed man.

NEWS ITEM

Senator Aldridge will deliver the second of a series of addresses explaining the work of the Monetary Commission at St. Louis. Maj. Gen. John T. Weston, chief of John T. Weston, will retire from active service in the army next Saturday. The news of his retirement has caused many promotions in the army service.

The Turkish Ministry will urge upon the Ottoman Parliament soon after it reconvenes, November 15, the adoption of a naval programme providing for the expenditure within the next seven years of \$100,000,000. The programme includes the building of seven battle ships of the North Dakota type. Upon the urgent plea of Mrs. Walter Scott, a prominent society woman of Lexington, and their commendation of Commonwealth's Attorney John R. Allen, Charles Gillis, a negro, now serving two years in the State prison at Frankfort on the charge of grand larceny will doubtless be pardoned from prison by Gov. Wilson when the case of the accused is put up to him as it will be in a few days.

Mrs. Scott, a few months ago lost a diamond brooch, valued at \$150, and suspicion of the theft of the jewel fell upon Gillis, who was employed as a houseboy in the Scott home. The negro stoutly denied the charge, but was tried, convicted by a jury and sentenced to two years in the penitentiary.

A day or two ago Mrs. Scott, in overhauling her inventory, discovered the missing jewel in the folds of her dresses. She has already been to see Gov. Wilson about a pardon for the negro, and Col. Allen has been asked to recommend that a pardon be issued at once.

At a meeting of the State Board of Agriculture, Forestry and Immigration Tuesday in the office of the Secretary of the State Fair Board in the Post Jones building, J. W. Newman, secretary of the fair, made his report for the year this year, held during September. The report is of the most gratifying nature, and shows that the interest in the State Fair is increasing annually. Mr. Newman in his report says that the net receipts for the fair this year were \$19,360.83. The highest amount netted before by the fair was \$13,624.32, which was made last year. The report says that the exhibits were larger and of a higher character this year than ever before. The total attendance during the fair was 104,942. Thursday was the banner day, the attendance being 33,521. The report states the horse show was a success in every respect and a large sum of money was paid for the exhibition of \$2,000 for lighting the big pavilion.

The Spanish Government Monday restored the constitutional guarantees in the Catalonia provinces of Barcelona and Gerona, which were suspended last July when the revolt broke out in these provinces.

Completing her Government trials at various speeds off the coast the battleship North Dakota steamed into Boston yesterday after having sped up and down the coast from Cape Cod to Cape Neddick, Me. for twenty-four hours at a sixteen-knot gait or faster.

The preliminary estimate of the average yield of a acre of tobacco is 507.7 pounds against 824.2 pounds as finally estimated in 1908. A total production of 895,184,935 pounds is thus indicated against 718,367,000 pounds as finally estimated in 1908. The quality is 86.9 per cent. against 87.9 per cent. in 1908.
