BRADLEY IN CINCINNATI

"I am here on law business," said United States Senator William O. Bradley, of Kentucky, when seen last evening at the Hotel Sinton. "My trip is in favor of improving the Ohio river and I presume that matter will be one of the most important propositions which will come up before Congress this winter. I do not expect to go to Washington until the beginning of the congressional session."

When asked concerning the present status of "night riding" in Kentucky and the efforts of Governor Wilson to put down these outrages, Senator Bradley said: "I think that 'night riding' in Kentucky has ceased to be an epidemic. Of course, there have been recent outbreaks of that character, but it appears now that the practice has been pretty well suppressed."
