Ten Bourbon County farmers are preparing to organize a Farmers Improved League. The object is to interest farmers in making their farms attractive, to induce them to keep their buildings and fences in good repair, fields clear of weeds and brush and the land in a high state of cultivation.

The Agricultural Department at Frankfort, has been holding in the Counties of the State what has been known as the Farmers' Institute, which has been thrown into a political purpose. We have, heretofore, advised our farmers to have nothing to do with that organization, but this paper is much interested in the success of the farmers and we fully realize the importance of organization on the part of each land holder. A great many farms are sadly neglected, to the detriment of the farm and the costs of the owner. Farmers can probably put in their spare time in improving the appearance of their fences and buildings.

In the Blue Grass the farmers have a desirable pride in their appearance.

thereof works awider. A rich down farm is an eye sore and requires much labor to be brought back to a state where it will be pleasing and attractive to the passing traveler. It is a loss of the power of remuneration.

An organization of the farmers will be beneficial for the purpose of enhancing the pride of the farm products and advancing the general interest of the farmer. It will increase the value of the farm and have an effect upon the whole community. Let the farmers organize in Rockcastle, that farm land might be improved and that the farmer may receive a greater benefit from his labors.

If the Governor of Kentucky and the coming Legislature desire to do something to benefit Eastern Kentucky, they can well afford to pass and approve a bill taking the convicts out of the penitentiary and constructing a model road from Crab Orchard to Cumberland Gap.

Under the present constitution, convicts cannot be taken out of the penitentiary except for the purpose of state work. Such a bill, therefore, would not be in conflict with the constitution but would be the greatest move that Kentucky could make to build up the mountainous section. A broad modern thoroughfare constructed along the old State Road at the expense of the state, which would be small, if the convicts were required to do the work, would be of untold benefit to this section. Possibly such a road would not otherwise be built and as the convicts are huddled now they come in contact with the best and most expert labor the county produces. The placing of them upon such work would not be to deprive the common laborers of employment, because without the state doing the work, possibly it would not be done at all.

We hope to see the Legislature take up such a movement and pass such beneficial legislation, for it would mean so very much to the mountainous counties which have always been neglected by the state authorities.

Colonel Jack Chinn, who was here Monday for the meeting of the State Racing Commission, discussed at some length recent criticisms of the saloon element that churches and other houses of worship were being used from time to time to propagate the political fight at present being waged to make Kentucky a "dry" State. Colonel Chinn notes the criticism with earnest purpose and agrees with the contention that no church should be used as a place for political propaganda, by either side, as the advocates of saloons or against them. He regards the matter purely political and to this end he will introduce a bill in the next General Assembly making it a misdemeanor even to discuss politics in a house of public worship. Colonel Chinn also believes that public school houses, when actually not in use for class work should be rendered available by statutory enactment for debates and public discussions of all kinds by leaders of thought in the various communities. He believes in the old fashioned debating society and his prospective measure is meant in no little sense to stimulate a revival of that interesting custom in Kentucky.—Lexington Gazette.

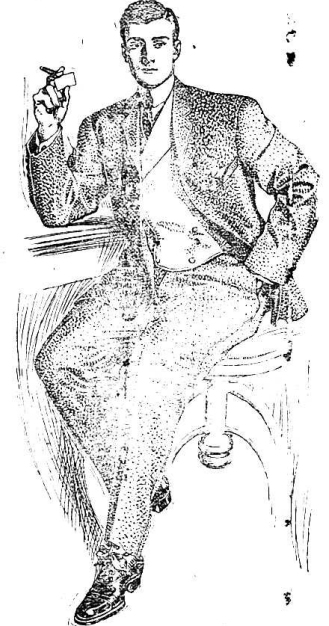

Mount Vernon Monumental WORKS

Pittsburg, Dec. 20.—Traimment to the number of 75,000, employed on about twenty-five railroads east of the Mississippi river, today through officials of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen at headquarters at Cleveland, O. formally notified the various divisions and railroads affected that a demand for an increase in wages amounting from 5 per cent. to 40 per cent. will be made on January 3. The agreement between the railroads and the trainmen necessitates a notice before a new demands can be made. The trainmen will wait until January 20 for an answer from the railroads, it is said.

According to W. G. Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, who is in this city attending the initiation of a number of men into the local here, the chief demand to be made was that the wages of conductors and the crew be standardized, which will mean increases of the various branches of the trainmen of from 5 to 40 per cent.

A strike is not yet contemplated said Mr. Lee. The trainmen believe that these demands will be granted Mr. Lee said the result of the recent referendum vote of the Eastern Association of the Brotherhood was canvassed at a meeting of the Executive Committee in Chicago Saturday, and that the result showed that they were almost unanimously in favor of presenting the demands and holding out for them until granted.
