"TAX-PAYER" ANSWERS QUESTIONS PUT BY "CITIZEN"

Mt. Vernon, Ky.
 Dec. 22 1909.

EDITOR OF SIGNAL:
 We need consider well the proposition raised by Miss McCord's published letter. The wise solution of the problem is this, — the Trustees of the Public School should employ the teachers of the College to teach the Public School in connection with the Brown Memorial. I am positive the pupils would get far better results. The teachers in the College are as well equipped to give our children the very best advantages and to thoroughly train them for High School.

The "Citizen" says that the "shacks" in town should be torn down and nice brick and concrete buildings erected instead. It is done in other towns and it can be done in Mt. Vernon. The individual business man can build a modern structure or if he builds by a combination of capital, amounting to a large money sum, the building can be erected. In

Catching erected a superb Hotel, — an honor to that town. "Bob" Jackson has just completed a block of magnificent buildings. Other citizens are equally as progressive and have contributed in many ways to the appearance and business facilities of that rapidly growing town. In addition, the leading citizens manifest a deep interest in the cause of education. In Somerset, the business and professional men do the same thing. O. H. Waddie, one of the leading lawyers, has been on the Board of Education for many years and the splendid schools of Somerset, for which it is well noted, are largely the result of his efforts. Fine business buildings are the result of the ambition of the business man and combination of capital. It is by such means that a town is made better in appearance and the trade is increased. All this can be done in Mt. Vernon.

"How can we get more revenue for the town?" says the "Citizen." I am glad to answer that question. First, let the people give in an honest list of taxable property and thereby increase the amount of taxes raised. Second, let the corporation limits be extended. On the west side of the junction of the Somerset and Crab Orchard Roads. This is right and no reasonable citizen, with the proper regard for municipal benefits and protection, will object. If he does pay no attention, go on and do it any way. Third, let the town be divided into wards and occupations and professions in the town. In Somerset the license to run a drug store is \$50.00 a year and yet the biggest objects to the paying of it. It is for the public good. The lawyers and doctors pay \$100.00 a year license. The license fee should not be that high in Mt. Vernon, but we do pay revenues should be raised by that system and that it should be immediately adopted by the new Board of Town Trustees.

The cities for many years have adopted such a plan for raising revenue and it is a slow for these days that has not followed it.
 "We have some splendid business men in this town who are getting rich. They are both here and there. The trouble is they do not give attention of their time to the advancement of local enter-

prise and municipal improvements. This they should do. The people want to take an interest, to be in the fight for the general up building of our community. Give us more paint brushes and paint; more concrete sidewalks; more brick and concrete building; greater interest in education; more men who are active and thrifty; men who do things and have municipal pride. Let us all get busy and push along the cause of public improvements. That Business Men's Club has not been born yet but we hope to hear of its birth shortly, for much good in the way of increasing trade and the building up of the town and which our city can be accomplished thereby.
