# TAX SYSTEM NEEDS REVISION

Address of A. Y. Ford to the Members of Kentucky Press Association.

### PRESENT MODE COSTS HEAVILY

Tax Revision Does Not Mean Exemption, But Fair Apportionment on All Kinds of Property—It Means Uniformity

Louisville.—The following is the address of Mr. A. Y. Ford before the Kentucky Press association at the mid-winter gathering in Louisville.

The tax system of a state deserves careful consideration, because the power to tax is the power to destroy and a tax lawlessly laid may easily shorten the life of a community or kill an industry. Approximately \$20,000,000 a year are taken from the pockets of the people of Kentucky for the support of the state, county and municipal governments. It is an unpalatable fact that a thing which means so much in dollars and cents to the people of the state should generally have received such scant consideration. It is difficult to understand why it should have been so hard at any time to secure from these charges, a fair and equitable apportionment of the burden and a careful and conscientious study of the methods by which these large revenues are raised. We have no special complaint to make of the tax system of this state. It should have been no considerable extravagance of the expenditure of the state. It is therefore time that we stop to consider whether these large sums are raised by the best possible methods, whether there are reasons in a way that distribute the burden fairly as between the members of this Commonwealth and whether the tax laws impose the legal burden consistent with the demand for revenue, and whether they do not place too heavy a burden as to offer the least inducement to the development of the state. Where there is competition between communities such as necessarily exist in a modern condition, an unwise system, laid without due consideration of the conditions, may impose upon the community the sharp competition for new population, new industries and new capital, may easily prove destructive of property.
