A persistent and generally credited rumor is circulating through the ranks of Kentucky politicians to the effect that Judge R. C. O'Keefe, of the Appellate Court at Frankfort, will be a candidate for the Republican nomination for Governor.

Although the members of the Kentucky delegation to the House have not definitely outlined their position in regard to the bill that will question the eligibility of Clegg Powers in that body, it is generally believed that, if Representative McHenry, of Anderson, carries the bill to a special conference in the House, it will receive the support of Kentucky Democrats in an attempt to prevent Powers retaining his seat.

Representatives throughout the state are about a Louisville and the meeting place for the next Democratic National Convention which will take place in Louisville, Ky. on the 10th of June.

Thomas B. McGregory, the present Third Assistant Attorney General at Frankfort, will make the race for the Republican nomination for Attorney General and has made formal announcement of his candidacy.

Senator Joe P. Bosworth, of Middleboro, is to have no opposition for the Republican nomination in the March primary at that place, according to report.

The tobacco situation throughout Kentucky is becoming grave since two widely differentiated factors are springing up, each of which seems determined in its present stand. Those in favor of the "cut out" policy for 1911 claim a majority, which is possibly true, but the minority that is in favor of

growing during the coming season is steadfast in its determination to follow out this policy.

More than 1,000 acres were pledged to the cut out plan at a recent meeting of Woodford county growers at Versailles. The minority that did not sign the pledge expressed itself as willing to do so whenever the independents took favorable action upon the subject.

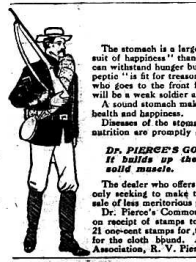

**HELM'S FIGHT.**

**AGAINST INCREASE IN SALARIES OF THE FEDERAL JUDGES.**  
 (By Louis Ludlow)  
 Washington, Jan 26—Representative Harvey Helm was a leading spirit in the successful fight in the House to prevent the proposed increase of salaries of Federal judges.

In a ringing speech against the increase, Helm said "a great deal has been said here on the floor that these salaries should be raised on account of the high cost of living."

"The Democratic party is not responsible for the high cost of living. May I be permitted to remind the House that the men who are called upon to pay these enormous raises of salaries, that this Congress is imposing on the taxpayers of the country are also suffering from the increased cost of living, and that they have children to be educated as well as the officeholder?"

"I have recently noticed in the papers that the salary of the president of the steel trust has been reduced from \$100,000 per annum to \$50,000 per annum. If this stupendous business corporation sees proper to reduce the salaries of its officers, it does occur to me that the prudent thing for Congress to do is not to increase the salaries of officers, but if possible to reduce them."

"I dare say that there has not a day passed since Congress convened that there has not been some effort made along the line to increase the salaries of men who draw their living at the public crib. It is an endless chain affair and it does seem that the time has arrived when the brake should be set. When a ball should be called and in the name of that was borne, that great army of taxpayers who are being bound under the burden of taxation, municipal, State and Federal, I appeal to this House to vote against this amendment."

**WARNING ADVISED**  
 Danville, Advocate 1910 was the Damage Suit Practice in Kentucky and Declares That it is Injuring the State.

The Daily Advocate at Danville Kentucky, for a number of years has been making a strenuous fight against the bringing of what is termed "suicide" damage suit against railway companies. In circuit court in Danville last week, Judge L. L. Walker threw out on peremptory instructions the case of Shberty Jones against the Queen and Crescent Route. In the first place, the Harns contract with the railway company to carry a car load of cross ties from one point to another in the Danville yards, Harns then hired Jones to assist in the work. On the first trip, Jones let a tie fall and smash his toe. Furthmore, through his attorney, he sued the railway company for \$1000 damages. Judge Walker promptly threw this as well as other similar cases out of court. In referring to this particular case, the Advocate says editorially in a current issue:

"The legislature ought to pass a law prohibiting the filing of such damage suits as this one. The heavy burdens occasioned by court costs must be paid by the taxpayers and taxes are already too high. This promiscuous damage suit practice is one of the paramount causes for Kentucky's lack of growth, as shown by the last census. In the first place, such methods prevent capital from coming into the State and on the other hand the atrocious jury and court costs make taxes. To the credit of Boyle county and Judge Walker such cases as these where the railway company is free from fault, are not permitted to occupy any more time than is absolutely necessary. The railway companies have a fixed policy paying all just claims promptly without litigation. Only cases that have little or no merit are permitted to go to court. It used to be that the average jury would give damages against a railroad on most any claim, but the educational weakening of this century has wiped out the old prejudice. Nowadays a railway company gets the same fair consideration as an individual."

An attempt is on foot in the International Convention of Ministers at Columbus, Ohio, to determine their opinion, so that international officers will not have the power to call off strikes.

Mrs. Lajay Farnsworth Schenk, wife of John O. Schenk, whom she was charged with attempting to poison, was released on her own recognizance Saturday, the bail being left at \$10,000. A few minutes before, she was served with papers in a divorce action brought by her husband.

The naval appropriation bill was reported to the House. It carries a total of \$125,421,538 which is over two millions less than the "Navy Department" estimate. Sixteen new vessels of different types are provided for.

The work of the Vermilion county grand jury, investigating alleged vote buying at Danville, Ill., is completed.

The war department issued orders treating the case of a deserter stationed along the Mexican border and a close watch will be kept on rebel sympathizers in this country.

The Connies Gyzicka, a daughter of R. W. Patterson, of Chicago has sued her husband for divorce. Statutory grounds and desertion are charged.

President William Lewis, of the United Mine Workers, has charged certain officers and members of the organization with graft.

What's the matter with business? Let a business man tell and let business men listen. President Wood, of the American Woolen Company, says that not one important woolen mill had been built in Massachusetts for a period of forty years until the McKinley law was introduced. With the exception of three new mills built under the Dingley tariff, every one of the thirty-odd concerns of the American Woolen Company has had to have its affairs readjusted or gone into bankruptcy. This is the bitter struggle that one American industry has had to attain its success. Now, a half a million persons depend upon it for subsistence and the wages in American woolen mills are twice those paid in England and three times the wages in Germany and Saxony. If the protective tariff is taken off, Mr. Wood, suggestively adds, "we manufacturers can go elsewhere but the American people can't. The threat of another such a sweeping loss of a subsistence of the subsisting and widening paupering program is the shadow that hangs over the prosperity of the United States. In defense of the much abused woolen tariff, Mr. Wood makes another point that the people should not forget. He says that the profit of the American Woolen Company in its cloth made in a fifty-dollar suit of clothes is less than fifty cents. Yet last month some people in and out of Congress and all of the yellow press were proclaiming that the tariff was responsible for the high cost of living."
