Buttermaking is an art. Fresh milk is always delicious. Open is caused by a small worm in the whey. Most farm buildings are built too close to the dwelling. In spreading a seed bed for sweet clover do it thorough job. Very little is known about the actual value of rye as a poultry food. The barn that is hatched up will have fewer draughts over the floor. Don't leave your valuable farm machinery standing unprotected in the field. Out straw is an excellent rough feed for sheep. Wheat straw is next in value. Overwintering the ewe flock during the winter months is a frequent cause of severe losses. Very early spraying with Bordeaux is the thing for kinds of fungus rot and for peach leaf curl. Fresh green horse is itself almost a complete food, and may be used as a special material for egg production. Farmers should not buy more land until that which they already have is producing to its maximum capacity. Freshness is of prime importance in several ways. It keeps the pigs alive and in a healthy condition generally. Before putting the chicks into the brooder it is a good plan to sprinkle them carefully with a good insect powder. One of the first needs of the pig is a comfortable place in which to fatten more than half of the time, sleeping and resting. Breeding stock should be selected for health, strength, vigor and maturity. It is a well known fact that properly managed a 50, 40 or 80 acre farm will return in addition to a living, a fine income for the family. The dairymen having a productive farm of 100 to 200 acres can realize a fair six to eight of his best market female calves each season. The annual income from milk and butter in the United States is said to be more than the output of the gold and the silver mines. Carrots are fed to horses not so much for their feeding value, but for their influence in keeping the digestive organs in good condition. It requires less to handle milk, cream or butter, so see to it that you will be fully equipped with this cheap article for next summer's use. In winter dairy farmers often forget that nothing is cheaper and more beneficial than pure air, sunlight and a reasonable amount of exercise. There is a steady demand for nuts. The English walnut, pecan, Spanish, Japanese and American chestnut, butter nuts and shellbears are the most profitable. The difficulties experienced in spreading poultry manure, on account of its sticky consistency may be avoided by mixing with loam, peat or common stable manure. Condiments that stimulate egg production are very much like anything that produce many eggs in the summer as the immediate results wear off the bird is in worse shape than before being fed. People think that if hens don't lay in the winter they will lay in the summer, but this is a mistake, as it has been found that the winter layers will produce as many eggs in the summer as the top-winter layers. As regards rotation of crops, unless the western farmer is willing to see his land become even in the present generation, as valuable for agricultural use as is so much of New England, he must adopt and adhere to some systematic use of restorative crops. LAND STOCK AND CROP. W. W. Bradton, of Lodiola, Mo., exhibited 24 ears White corn that weighed 20 pounds. The twenty ears which this corn was grown averaged 70 bushels per acre. The cold winter has saved the Chicago commission merchants from bankruptcy. Prices of cold storage goods are soaring as the result of the cutting off of fresh supplies. A farmer near Russellville, Ark. has been raising sweet potatoes for eight years. From two acres last year he secured 1,140 bushels per acre, and the average yield from his farm was 325 bushels to the acre, for which he ordinarily gets \$1 per bushel.

The midwinter sale of the Pacific Trust Company held in New York was a very successful one and shows conclusively that light horse affairs are in splendid condition. During the four days sale 417 head were disposed of at a total of \$400,335 or an average of \$480 per head. At Broughton, Mass., last Monday, Daniel W. Field sold his 7 year old rody purple bull calf by Aggie Coranopia Panline and sired by Colartha Johanna Lad to W. H. Milner of Chicago, the purchase price being \$10,000, the highest, it is said, ever paid for a young bull.

At Tippecanoe City, Ohio, last week a barrowed in March 1910 by Cherry King, out of Highland Lady sold for \$507. This sale averaged \$117.50 per head. A. T. Tucker of Winchester Ky., purchased a sow by Cherry King, out of Ira's Wonder. Sixty head were sold at an average of \$131.

Speculators in a second grade butter in New York and Chicago have been unable to find a market for all of their cold storage, hold-ings, and will, it is said, be compelled to ship 3,000,000 pounds of the product to Europe to save themselves from absolute loss. One large speculator purchased it for 31 and 32 cents a pound, put it in storage, and now is selling it at an average wholesale price of 25 cents a pound.

The Dover News says: "When it was stated at Winchester a buyer for the American Tobacco Company said the average price of the 1910 crop would not be above eight cents, it was claimed that such could not be the case and it was 'a scare' of the Burley Society to induce growers to pool. Now since the pool went down notice how closely the general averages of the 1910 crop verge on eight cents. Last week the average was \$8.25 per hundred."

That sheep scabies has cost Kentucky farmers and sheep raisers \$300,000 during the last year was the announcement made last week by Dr. A. J. Payne of the Bureau of Animal Industry of Washington D. C. who has been sent to this state to stay the spread of the infection. Dr. Payne said: "Kentucky is now under a

strict sheep quarantine on account of the prevalence of scabies among the sheep of the state. This means that no sheep can be shipped from Kentucky for breeding or feeding purposes and can be shipped out of the state only for immediate slaughter. Scabies does not affect the meat of the sheep, but sheep having scabies are always thin and poor market meat on this account. This disease has lost the sheep raisers of the state about \$300,000 in the last year, as a sheep affected with scabies deteriorates in value from 30 to 50 cents. The assessors book two years ago indicated there were 950,000 sheep in the state. We are now winding up the work in about 50 counties, and a favorable outcome is expected of the campaign against the disease. Kentucky has always raised the best sheep to be obtained, and up until recently this state sold more sheep for breeding purposes than any other state in the Union. Scabies, while highly contagious, is not a malignant disease and we hope to have the evil entirely eradicated by time of the fall shipments.

## BOURIST SUGGESTS SCHOOL INSPECTION

### Believes Would Save Money for the State

#### A GAP THAT SHOULD BE FILLED

They Would Have About the Same Province as Bank Examiners and Report on Financial as Well as Educational Matters.

Frankfort.—Two school inspectors, whose duties should be somewhat similar to those of bank examiners, are suggested as a remedy needed in Kentucky. The suggestion comes from Judge C. R. McDowell, of Danville, who appeared before the committee on education, Judge McDowell believes that the present inspectors are not doing their duty, inspecting the schools and watching the disposition of the money for the state. The inspectors could be saved every year and the schools greatly benefited as well. He says there is now an objection on the part of three and one-half million dollars every year to schools. The state inspector can not raise the hands and the superintendent of public instruction can not, there being a gap which must be bridged by a law.

The plan is proposed in to lay the matters for the schools," said Judge McDowell. "They would work like bank examiners. They would go to school, examine the teacher and pupils and records, with full authority to demand books and receipts. This inspector would check the books as to complying with the law and that the pupils are complying with the law and that the schoolhouse are kept in proper condition. Then this examiner would also examine the finances of the school and see that the state's money is being spent for the school in the right amount. The state pays out \$5,000,000 every year for schools and that is so way that the state's money is used to the advantage of the schools and it flows in the proper channel."

"I would suggest that the man who is to be inspector for the western district, the state being divided into two districts, be selected from the western district and a man in the eastern district be selected from the western part of the state. This bill is only in a formative state now, but the school leaders expect to take it up and work it out."
