FREE LAND ON THE COUR D'ALENE RESERVATION.

Few people live in the mountains of the north states that there is a land to be had from the Government at \$1.25 per acre. When I was over in the South country in western Washington I found the hill country taken possession of by the mountain people of Kentucky, Virginia and Tennessee. And they were all doing well. As I am now in eastern Washington I believe I have discovered a similar opportunity for those who still would like to come. This opportunity is to be found on the Cour d'Alene Reservation in Idaho just over the border from Fairfield Township in Washington, where there is still over sixty sections of land still open to settlement, 38,400 acres in all.

The conditions under which this land may be taken up are as follows: a man must first see the land and then must declare his intention to take a certain piece of it, he may take from forty to one hundred and sixty acres, and then he must make his first payment of twenty five cents an acre. After this he has six months to get into actual residence on the land. He must actually reside on the land for fourteen months before he can get a deed to it. The only improvements he is required to make is the building of a small house. Many of the present settlers have constructed neat little cottages of logs.

As to the nature of the land no irrigation is required. In the village of Fairfield alone where irrigation is unknown more than a million bushels of wheat is shipped annually. The land which is still to be had is rough and timbered but when cleared can much of it be farmed. The settler is permitted to cut down his timber and sell the lumber and wood. If he clears and turns brush as he goes. Wood in the villages of Washington and Idaho is worth \$6.00 per cord and lumber in the log from \$5.00 to \$4.00 per thousand. This timber for the most part yellow pine, bull pine, fir and tamarack. The land is at present from three to thirty miles from rail roads but new roads are under process of construction.

There is an abundance of spring water. Schools will be established as fast as settlements warrant. The land lies in adjoining tracts a group of families from adjoining country could live on this new and next door neighbors.

The climate is similar to that of Southern Kentucky. There is not quite as much rain in summer and the winters are perhaps five degrees colder on the average. The nights are too cool to make corn raising profitable but all other raising flourish. Potatoes and other vegetables do well and apples grow abundantly with little care.

The rail road companies are offering special rates to this country from March to April 10, from Chicago to Fairfield \$33.00, from Kansas City to Fairfield \$25.00.

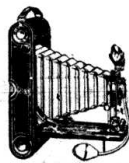

BEST WAY.

The speediest and easiest way to benefit mankind would be for every person to reform their own life, regardless of what others are doing. Such a policy would bring about a change for the better in both public and private affairs, and so after the relationship of mankind that everyone would strictly mind his own business.

Meddlesome persons who are continually prying into other people's affairs and carrying tales between friends and acquaintances create a great deal of mischief as best contented when they can spread scandal. It seems more natural for them to speak ill of a person than to utter words of praise, and their habit of gossiping become so fixed that they can talk scandal almost unconsciously. It is just as easy to say good words for friends and acquaintances, even if not wholly deserved, as it is to speak ill of them, and the effect on the community is always beneficial in a general way. Scandal gathers strength as it travels by word of mouth and can never be recalled when once in circulation. Try speaking well of everyone and see what a change it will make in your own happiness as well as in the welfare of others.

The worst habit that boys can fall into is that of loafing around on the streets at night. It is then they cast their lot in slippery places when at any moment they are likely to fall from grace. All

good and noble lessons taught in their homes, and are there forgotten and nullified. They learn nothing that is good—but everything bad. The boys who spend their evenings in the sacred precincts of home with good books for their companions are the future hope of this republic; they will fill our legislative and congressional halls, and sit in judgement upon men and measures, while the boys who run the streets will fill our penitentiaries, almshouses and lunatic asylums. Parents who are responsible for these broken laws of decency will have broken hearts and bowed down heads in the awakening years that will inevitably follow.

We owe it to the community in which we live to do everything we can in every way possible that will be to its advantage. Our neighbor's prosperity means a great deal more to us than some one's who lives elsewhere. We should bear this in mind in buying our goods. We can afford to pay our home man a firm price for his wares rather than send our money away, knowing as we do that every dollar out in maintaining our schools, churches and public institutions. It is pavidly to patronize home industry.

JUDGE William M. Reed, of Paducah, made his formal announcement Tuesday as a candidate for the Democratic nomination for Governor.

Judge Reed's announcement is as follows: "To the Democratic Voters of Kentucky: Believing that every man, at certain times in his life must answer to the call of his country, whether it may be his personal desire or not, and having been solicited from every section of the State to become a candidate for the Democratic nomination for Governor, and having been over-whelmingly supported by the people of my immediate section, and appreciating fully the honor it would be to any man to be the Governor of this great Commonwealth, after mature deliberation, I now announce myself as a candidate for such nomination. I shall endeavor from now

on all the date of the primary election to present my claims to the Democratic voters of the State so that I may, at such primary be the recipient of the honor I seek. In seeking this nomination I do so with the full knowledge and understanding of the responsibilities which by virtue of the high office, must not necessarily be incumbent upon me if elected, understanding that in the immediate future of this State the action of its Chief Executive will have much to do with its ultimate progress, and understanding that in a great measure the prosperity and happiness of her people will be promoted or retarded by the influences exerted by her Chief Executive.

"Being my native State, wherein I have grown to an age past the meridian of life, and in whose prosperity I have always rejoiced, I shall give to this position, if elected to it, every effort of my mind to bring this State, during my administration, material good. I shall tell to the State, in addresses I expect to make those things for which I stand and which I could not at this time elucidate to the satisfaction of myself or those to whom this is meant to address."

AS TO PLATFORM CONVENTION.

"I am a Democrat from principal and have always been, and one thing I shall urge as a Democrat and especially as a Democratic candidate is that a convention of the Democrats of Kentucky be called by the governing authorities of the party for the purpose of writing a platform of principles so that the world may know for what the Democratic party in Kentucky stands. When this convention shall be held is a matter of indifference, so it is convened sufficiently early in the campaign to be made against a common enemy, so that the Democrats of Kentucky may be able to make their fight upon a platform they adopted."

"I might say further that I belong to no faction nor have I ever belonged to any faction political in Kentucky. I appeal to all classes of individuals to give due consideration to my claims, and if upon consideration it is their honest belief, and so expressed at the polls, that I would better subscribe in the interest of the State and of the people than any other who is an aspirant or may become one of such distinction, I shall feel very grateful."

The Louisville General Council will be asked to contribute to the fund to secure the Democratic national convention.

An important case was decided by the Court of Appeals Wednesday in the matter of Hunt's administrator against the Louisville and Nashville Railway Company. Hunt was employed as a flagman and when his train was stopped for reasons now unknown, he was sent back to stop another train which was approaching. Instead of stopping the train and keeping out of the way of it as was his duty, he remained on the track and was run over and killed. The Court of Appeals in dismissing the case says that it was not the duty of the railway company to send a guard along with the flagman to keep him off the track as he was supposed to be able to take care of himself. The Rockcastle circuit court gave the administrator a verdict for \$7,000 damages against the railway company. Hon. Robt. Harding of Danville, and Atty. C. C. Williams represented Hunt's administrator.

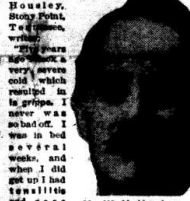
