For the important office of State Auditor the Republican party has nominated as an associate of Judge O'Rear, Judge L. W. Bethuram, of Rockcastle county and the Democratic party has nominated Mr. Henry Bosworth of Lexington.

The Evening Post has no disposition to say anything disagreeable about Mr. Bosworth, who is personally an amiable and attractive man, but no doubt exists that the Republican nominee is for many reasons the best man for the place—the record in importance upon the State ticket, as far as the actual business of the State is concerned, little if any less important than the office of Governor.

Mr. Bosworth is a rough and ready Lexington politician of the jolly Klair faction. He has always been closely identified with the

quod idtrests in politics and in 1907 when as now, he was the nominee of his party for Auditor, he was charged with entering into certain combinations with the liquor interests that in the end proved disastrous to Democratic ticket. Mr. Bosworth has been Sheriff of Fayette county and a spoke in the old wire chair Machine that the voters of Lexington repudiated in part two years ago, and will probably repudiate in full this fall.

Mr. Bethuram, on the other hand is thoroughly in sympathy with Judge O'Rear's platform and Judge O'Rear's policies and is himself well equipped for this position. He is a man of solid characteristics, possessed of excellent judgement but no means a corporation baiter and yet firm for the rights of the public in the matter of assessments and taxation.

The duties of the Kentucky State Auditor are numerous and varied. In the first place the Auditor is at the head of the bookkeeping system of the State. Kentucky needs a new system of accounting and she should promote a uniform system throughout the country. In the second place the Auditor acts as chairman of the State Board of Assessments, the board that fixes franchise values for purposes of State taxation, and this is one of the most important places in the State government. In the third place a Auditor supervises the collection of the revenues of the State, appoints the revenue agents, with authority to restrain those officers, and checks up the payments of Sheriff and County Clerks.

Mr. Bethuram is, therefore, a candidate for a State office the importance of which has never been fully realized by the State, and he is the best man for this position. His presence on the Republican ticket is an reason for voting for O'Rear.

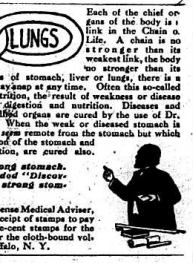
