THE PRIMARY MUST COME

The editorial in the Louisville Times of Sept. 28th, strongly commending the direct primary election law, which the next legislature will enact, in accordance with the plank, on that subject, in the platform of each party, is one of several articles—that show how strong a fight that always influential Democratic paper is prepared to make for that righteous legislation. It makes it clear that it is in the will of the Democratic party and the party's mandate to the party authorities, as well as to the Legislature, that all Democratic nominations shall hereafter be by primary election, in which every Democratic voter shall have a vote and have that vote counted. There is a strong current, as evidenced by the increasing popularity of the initiative and referendum, the election of Senators by popular vote and the universal demand for nominations by direct primaries to get the control of legislation back into the hands of the people.

made by some aspirants for next year's nominations by their friends, in trying to arrange in advance for an evasion or defiance of the party's will. We refuse to believe that any of the talked of candidates for office would, this early, be so bold or so suddenly unwise as to attempt by a combination or conspiracy of any kind to "fringe up" a nomination on a convention instead of the primary method, to which the party is pledged and by which the party authorities are bound. When the time for the next nominations falls round, each candidate says it must be made. We have the opportunity to vote for the man of his choice, and every Democrat who wants to run for office will have the opportunity of doing so without paying the expense of the primary, but he should seek the nomination in the way the party says it must be made.

Would any democrat seeking office, dare, were he a member of the next legislature, to vote against the direct primary election law, for which the present party platform declares? If not, how can he now, or later, ask his county committee, who is headed by the same platform to vote for a convention? The honest, disinterested county committee with which the party is blessed, will never vote to deprive their Democratic neighbors of a voice in these or other nominations, and should not be asked to do so.

ANNOUNCE FOR TOWN TRUSTEES.

We, the undersigned, announce our names as candidates for Trustees of the Town of Mt. Vernon, subject to the action of the voters of said town, to be voted for at the regular November election, 1911, and if elected we will stand for the fulfillment of the following platform:

1. We oppose the license tax, or special privilege tax on trades, occupations and professions.
2. We favor the reduction of all property tax, consistent with the best interest of the town.
3. The owners of property in the town have been required to construct concrete sidewalks at their expense, which constitutes practically the only improvement made in the town for a number of years. We now favor that the streets be macadamized at the expense of the town, and to be paid for out of the general taxes, and not by the individual tax payers as the sidewalks were paid for; also that crossings, where needed, be constructed at the expense of the town.
4. We are not opposed to the further construction of sidewalks, but favor the extension of same or the further construction thereof, within the corporate limits of the town, when and where needed.
5. We favor a monthly report to the Board of Collectors of Taxes, and the Treasurer of the Town, showing the amount of taxes collected, and the amount paid out, and for what purpose some are disbursed.
