KENTUCKY CROP REPORT

Crop conditions throughout the State are about normal for this season according to the report of the Kentucky Department of Agriculture.

Seventy per cent of the wheat crop and 78 per cent of the rice crop have been sown. The average of wheat is 105 per cent. as compared with last year, while the average of rice is estimated at 95 per cent. The average condition of corn is 85 per cent. Tobacco has been cut and is generally in good condition. The quantity is not so great as last year, but most of the county reports indicate that the quality is much better. The average of other crops is good; live pastures are flourishing and live stock is in first-class condition. While the early Irish potato crop was poor, the late crop is better, and sweet potato crops generally are fine. Soy beans, cowpeas and alfalfa average high.

That is all around, the October report is full of encouragement for the farmers and for everybody else, since all classes are largely dependent on the efforts of the farmers for prosperity. The annual Thanksgiving season is approaching and Kentuckians will have abundant cause to give thanks for the agricultural outcome of the year and for future prospects. Kentucky is a productive State and is adapted to a great variety of products. It is hard to conceive of any limit to her possibilities in the agricultural line. Much of her fertile land is yet undeveloped and the vast body of her farmers have not learned the rudiments of scientific farming. For all that, Kentucky in this good year of 1911, as in previous years will have "corn to sell and keep," tobacco to supply the needs of the large portion of world, livestock and other things for export and plenty of pretty much everything that is necessary for home consumption. All of which should be a glad Thanksgiving day merry Christmas in the "Old Kentucky Home."

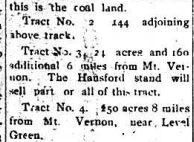

No other class of men in Kentucky can give more effectively in the working-out of these problems than the County Judges. The Times would suggest that the invitation of Judge Weissinger be supplemented by an invitation from those having in charge the Greater Kentucky Conference and that the County Judges be made welcome at both conferences.

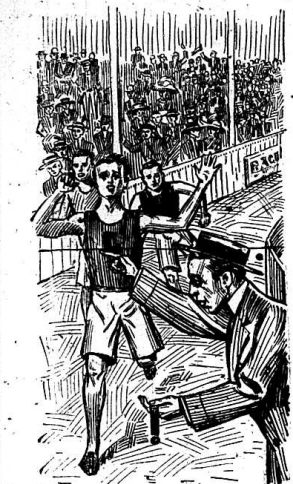

Reasons Why Mr. Bosworth Should Be Defeated for the Senate and Dr. Hendren Elected.

FIRST.—Mr. Bosworth is not in line with either party on the County Unit Bill. Dr. Hendren will support and vote for the uniform County Unit Bill.

SECOND.—Four years ago, Bosworth promised to support and vote for the County Bill. He flagrantly betrayed his promise and gave his support to the liquor interest, as his vote on Senate Bill 1 to 44 will show.

THIRD.—Mr. Bosworth does not justly represent the people of the District, but stands for the Middlesboro liquor crowd—an insult to thousands of the good citizens of the District.

FOURTH.—Bosworth has been against the laboring man's interest, as his record will show.

FIFTH.—Mr. Bosworth's GOOD ROADS talk, we believe insincere—only a vote catcher. Dr. Hendren will not only support the County Unit, but Good Roads as well. Good roads are safer in the hands of a temperance candidate than a liquor man.

SIXTH.—The liquor crowd is boosting Bosworth, not for Good Roads, but because they know he will deliver the wet goods in the Senate.

SEVENTH.—Will the good people of the Seventeenth Senatorial District vote for a candidate with a whiskey barrel on his back, or a clean temperance man? Vote for Dr. Hendren, November Election.

EIGHTH.—Helburn was defeated by the Republicans of the State for Lieutenant Governor because of his views on the liquor question. He was backed by the liquor interest. Bosworth and Helburn are brothers-in-law, partners in business, have the same political principles and Helburn is Bosworth's chief backer.

NINTH.—To send Bosworth to the Senate again, with his liquor views known as well as they are, would be for the Republicans of the 17th Senatorial District, which is a dry territory and for the County Unit, to slap the Republicans of the State in the face for defeating his brother-in-law, Helburn, because he was against the County Unit bill, Bosworth being backed by the same crowd, the liquor ring, that was backing Helburn.

TENTH.—Let the Republicans of the 17th Senatorial District repudiate Bosworth, as did the Republicans of the State, Helburn, on account of his liquor record in the Senate.

ELEVENTH.—The defeat of Bosworth and the election of Dr. J. Harry Hendren means that the people of the district will have a representative in the Senate who will not betray them, but vote with either party on the County Unit Bill.

TWELFTH.—Remember, Republicans in the 17th Senatorial District, that you had no opportunity to say whether you wanted Bosworth or not. The committee met in January with about six or seven men in prison and by proxy, fixed a primary exactly forty days, made the entrance fee three thousand dollars that a man had to put up to enter. Why did they do this? Because Bosworth, with his liquor record, was afraid to submit to the will of the people, knowing that the territory he would be forced to be a candidate in was in favor of the County Unit Bill and would condemn his action in the Senate.

Judge O'Rear, in his speech of acceptance, said none should be trusted on the Republican ticket who was not in line and sympathy with the platform.

The voters who are in favor of the County Unit in the 17th Senatorial District owe it to themselves to see that Bosworth is defeated.

Bosworth Responsible for the Defeat of the County Unit Bill

Ex-Mayor Woods, of Richmond, Tells How Bosworth Killed the Bill

Almost Persuaded to Vote Right, But the Whiskey Interest Must Be Protected

SO JOE VOTED WRONG

(From the Berea Citizen) Richmond, Ky., Oct. 19th, 1911. Editor Berea Citizen:— I endorse your condemnation of Senator Joe Bosworth of Middlesboro for re-election to the State Senate. I want to give you a piece of personal know ledge of Joe Bosworth's treachery and betrayal of the County Unit, not only two years ago, but four years ago, in the memorable struggle to get a vote on the County Unit Bill.

Here is the story living in my mind in brief and white as I write was most of it. I saw Bosworth cast the vote which killed the County Unit Bill, March 5, 1908. Weeks of hard work on our part had led us to the passage of the solidly Democratic Rules Committee and the committee on Religion and Morals, of which Bosworth was a member. I saw him give us a chance to VOTE RIGHT, VOTE SENSATE BURMAN, Republican of this district, appealed to Bosworth on the floor to remember his party platform pledges and his sacred obligation to the overwhelming majority of his constituents by standing with Senators who demanded a VOTE on the County Unit Bill. But Bosworth, with the memory of the glittering barroom of Middlesboro instead of remembering his bigged honors and ruined lives these denials of iniquity had produced deliberately VOTED TO PROTECT THE BILL. Just his one vote was needed to carry the tyrannous Rules Committee, but alas! what stoical indifference Bosworth voted with the WHISKEY RING and killed the Bill. God knows that was a scene that made angels weep. To think of a man who gave his seat in the Senate to 157,000 temperance people in his District, and yet to please 24 saloons in Middlesboro and the liquor power of Kentucky, turned a deaf ear to duty and humanity—such perfidy should bury him beneath such a mountain in November that all the miners of the Mingo Valley, could not dig him out in a thousand years.

I myself appeared before the Religion and Morals Committee of which this Bosworth had been made a Member by those other whiskey servants who knew how he would kate the Bill. I pleaded, with that

Committee with all my heart, a Senator Burman did next month, but all I got was this from the same Bosworth, who called me to his office and took me by the hand and said: "Woods, you'll almost certainly be elected to vote right in this matter." Thinking of the words of Paul I replied, "Not almost but altogether would I persuade you to do your duty. Flatter not my poor power of speech, but think of the joy of doing your duty for your people up in the Mountains." But as I say, the next morning Joe Bosworth, voted WRONG, and by my own written record, I think before me says, "KILLED BY ONE VOTE—BOSWORTH'S Men of the Mountains! Democrats, Republicans, what not, will you allow such political and moral servility to go longer unrebuked? What virtue is there a your pure blooded veins that will allow you to turn down such a consecrated christian gentleman as my old schoolmate, Dr. Harry Hendren, to endorse the record of Bosworth who represents an part of your section but Middlesboro, and whose saloons would be the scenes of greatest rejoicing over his victory next month. Talk not to me about Bosworth as a Good Roads Champion! The Whiskey Ring calls him that to fool and flatter the ignorant and the indifferent. The roads he has helped to make thus far are already paved with the skulls of men and boys ruined by the saloons of his city, and of Pineville, and surrounding territory. Those are the Roads of which he is the Father! Roads that lead, blood stained and tarbed with the blood of our Magic City to the humble coils of the mountain fastnesses. Strike ye mountaineers, a blow that will ring around the State! Down with Bosworth! Up with Hendren!"
