To Editor of Mt. Vernon Signal. My dear sir:-

Would you be kind enough to allow the space in your paper for this article. I am a taxpayer in the town of Broadhead, have lived in said town nearly all my life and while I am a poor man, I have at all times made it a point to do all in my power to assist in every way possible to build up our town. I notice in the last issue of your valuable paper, your Broadhead correspondent writes an article in reference to side walks being built in our town. He states that our town board passed an ordinance on last Wednesday night that one and one half mile of concrete side walk must be made not later than Aug. 1st. 1912. He says in this article that a number of citizens were present at the meeting of said board. I am sorry to say that the number was very small and I do know that two thirds of the tax payers who are now and have been opposed to the proposed plan that has been mapped out by the town board to build our sidewalks. I know of property owners who do live and own property on the proposed route that these sidewalks will benefit by running directly in front of their doors, who are positively against the way this board is trying to force the side walks to be built. I again know that the town board has made all kinds of promises to different citizens in our town who never had side walks in front of their property and who pay their tax every year for them they would build side walks for them. I know that they have never yet made an effort in any way to build these walks. I am a tax payer as I have told you and pay a large tax and it does look like that it our money is to go to build these walks that it should and ought to be divided more equally than the proposed route that has been planned. Now don't understand me to be against sidewalks, but I am against the plan of some few individuals saying what we should do. I am perfectly willing to do all I can to assist in making these walks, but I am opposed to the route they have laid out. You see I am a citizen who have never received any benefit from the money that has been expended in our town and now these very people are to be deprived of the side walks if they are built as they have been mapped out. But in my judgement this seems to be a one sided issue. If you are to build side walks doesn't it look like you could divide the thing up a little. The route in town is the very highest ground in the town and only a few low bad places. Just look at the directions of our town and examine for yourselves and see if it would not be better to spend some of this money you have in the town treasury in making these sidewalks on some of our streets down to the mud hole for hundreds of yards.
