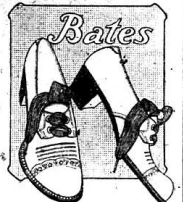

Lexington, Ky., March 25.—Leaving here over the Chesapeake & Ohio railroad this morning and continuing on a journey for four weeks, covering seventy of the leading agricultural counties of the State, the biggest agricultural train ever run in any State South of the Ohio river started on its long educational journey and returning will roll into the Union depot at 5:30 p. m. on the afternoon of Tuesday, April 23.

The purpose for which the train is being run and of those who will compose the personnel of the party of lecturers and instructors aboard is to instruct the people at the most important stopping points along the line of travel in modern methods of agriculture, live stock and poultry production, domestic science and in the knowledge of soils, fertilizers and soil fertility. Eight cars compose the train. On Saturday it was inspected by Commissioner of Agriculture J. W. Newman and was found to be the first class shape. In the live stock car are two cows, two hogs, two sheep and a flock of poultry. This car will be next to a flat car which will be specially arranged for demonstration work.

Mr. Sterling was the first stop. The train is under the supervision of T. R. Bryant, superintendent of the extension bureau of the College of Agriculture, and President H. S. Barker, of the university. Director M. A. Scovell, of the Experiment Station, and College of Agriculture and State Secretary of Agriculture J. W. Newman.

In charge of the dairy demonstration is Prof. J. I. Hooper, assisted by Prof. A. J. Reed, Prof. Geo. Roberts has charge of the gronomy car, assisted by Prof. Joseph E. Wing, of Ohio, the noted agricultural lecturer; the horticultural car is under the supervision of Prof. C. W. Mathews, assisted by Prof. G. H. Smith, of the Eastern Kentucky Normal School at Richmond; Miss Aulva Chinn, of State University, has charge of the domestic science car, and is assisted by Miss Knowles, a Iowa, and teachers from the Eastern Kentucky Normal School at Richmond and the Western Kentucky Normal at Bowling Green, while Prof. E. S. Good is in charge of the live stock car, assisted by Prof. J. J. Hooper.

THE MAINE'S DEAD.

More than fourteen years after they went to their death at their post of duty in Havana harbor, fitting repelch has been given to sixty-three unidentified bodies of the Maine's crew. They are now at rest in the soil reserved by the nation for its hero dead. No honor was omitted from the act of their interment. The men who have lain, as it seemed, forgotten since that February night in 1898 have been brought home at last to a country which by their death has been transformed from an isolated people into a World Power. In those fourteen years it has been buried with many and new problems in the exciting, friendly, protectorate, the administration of colonial possessions and the subtleties of Eastern politics.

It has grown to think and to speak in world terms. It is good to know that, despite the intercession of this new experience, it has not wholly lost the simple virtues of remembering reverently such as have served it faithfully.—Louisville Times
