**SCHOOL SUFFRAGE.**

**CAMPAIN INAUGURATED BY KENTUCKY FEDERATION OF WOMEN'S CLUBS.**  
Law Granting School Suffrage to Kentucky Women to be Held in Effectiveness at Mt. Vernon, Ky. on Monday, Nov. 10.

Lexington, Ky.—The Education Department of the Kentucky Federation of Women's Clubs has announced a campaign which will continue throughout the month of July, August and September.

The greatest effort will be made to secure the widest possible representation of the various Teachers' Institutes, and a letter has been sent by the Education Department of which Mrs. E. N. Roark, of Richmond, is Chairman.

Get Out the Vote.  
It is the policy of the Education Department simply to work to get out a large vote for the most efficient candidates, and to furnish, through the public press, such brief and necessary information about election laws...

Rockcastle Building Stone

HUMMEL AND WILDE QUARRIES

Rockcastle has two fine building stone quarries in operation; one located at Hummel (Langford, p. 10) and the other at Wilde, both on K. O. division of the L. & N. railroad. The Kentucky Freestone Co., incorporated, was organized in 1900 and quarries opened at Hummel station four miles north east of Mt. Vernon. The owners are: Cincinnati base, one with John Sperry as president, G. Ellis Hummel, secretary and treasurer; George Hummel, manager; William Hummel and Frank Hammett, stockholders. D. L. Carter superintendent. The company owns 100 acres of quarry lands in the tract, in and around Langford.

Four years ago this company worked to men in the quarries and shipped four cars stone yearly run three stone drills, channeled machine, dummy locomotive, but since the general introduction of concrete the output has been a down probably 50 per cent. The ledge being worked now varies in thickness from 4 to 9 feet. Three colors are found, buff, olive and blue. The buff usually occurs under light stripping, mostly flat. Olive shows up further back in the hill and under harder stripping material in way of dirt mixed with slate. The blue is usually under very heavy strip ping but at times is found in outcroppings under a light covering of dirt. In the heavy stripping it sometimes requires big charges of powder to raise the strata from the workable ledge. Richer beds or two thousand pounds of black powder has been used in a single blast. Dynamite doesn't answer the purpose in the slaty formation which covers the

on truck cars which remain there until the operation is finished. The saws are swung above the stone to be cut, and when running feeds or lowers itself automatically as the work progresses. It does its work by feeding, and does water to the saws or at the point where the saws come in contact with the rock. Perforated water pipes keep up a constant sprinkling during the operation and an occasional "squeal" of sand is heard upon when needed. It can be seen, therefore, that instead of sawing the stone the saws literally "rub" their way through. Lee Proctor is under the impression that the old "rubber neck" sawing method here originated from a stone saw mill somewhere if not at Hummel.

The work of quarrying usually begins about 20th of March and closes down late of November as freestone when taken from the ground is "green" and in cold weather freezes readily and disintegrates and therefore worthless for building purposes. In warm weather this stone, while green or soft when taken from the ground soon seasons or hardens, after being in the atmosphere for a time. The stopping of quarrying in the fall, does not throw the men out of work. They are retained to do stripping and shaping up the plant for next seasons quarrying and doing other work about the mill and premises. The labor is all from our county and most of the men own their homes in the neighborhood of the quarries. Bill Shearer is the plant blacksmith. A majority of these men have been on the job for some years, and most of all they can turn their hand to any line of work on the job, ran an engine, steam drill, channeled machine or do blasting. As a rule, Dooley was quarry foreman for a number of years. Joe Dooley, George and Abe Evans and Bill Shearer are always on hand, and ready to do the "overhead work, rigging and oiling 80 foot derricks, splicing cables and numerous other duties.

The Rockcastle Stone Co., the first to open quarries at Langford sold their holdings some years ago, to the company now on the grounds.

The Kentucky Rockcastle Stone Co., incorporated, was established in 1900 and has their quarries located at Wilde, near mouth of Clear Creek, and own 20 acres of land there. The president, Archibald Oliver, of Cincinnati, is also general manager and owns a majority of the company's stock. Moses McNew is manager and foreman at quarry. Fifteen or more men are employed on the works. They have on outfit in way of machinery, steam drills, saw mill etc., similar to that of the Hummel plant, with the exception of a channeled machine. Dooley and Dannon are the steam drill men. The general operation of the works are near by same as that followed at Hummel. The quarry at present, of one ledge, only shows one color, a splendid blue, of an average thickness of 7 feet 8 inches. Their product is marketed in Cincinnati. This plant claims that the best concrete throughout the country has not interfered with the volume of their business. Alex Mann is the quarry blacksmith. The labor used at Rockcastle and usually live in the neighborhood of the works.

These two quarries have proved of great benefit to the county, more especially in the neighborhood of their location, and are continuing in the good work.
