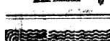

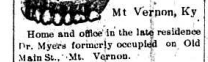
Cull McClure's five acre meadow of bottom land was to fall and heavy to cut with a machine and it was found necessary to use corn knives in harvesting the crop. The hay, or rather stalks, were set upon end in shocks, like corn and as previous had done to hold it. The crop will have to be cut through a shredding machine before stock can eat it. Too coarse. Cull has not sworn to the truthfulness of this year but says he is willing to do so at any time if any doubting Thomas should demand it. Under "Fruit Matting" will have to lump themselves mightily to even up with Cull's hay crop.

WASHOUT WRECKS TRAIN; PASSENGER ESCAPES.

L. H. & ST. LOUIS ENGINEER, SCRAMBLING DANGER, BACKS CREEK AWAY JUST BEFORE CAVE-IN OCCURS.

Louisville, Ky., July 23rd.—Crew and passengers of Louisville, Henderson and St. Louis train, which left here on Sunday night for St. Louis, returned yesterday with an interesting story of unusual experiences. Thirty miles out the passenger's engineer saw the rear end lights of another train, a freight, the progress of which was stopped by a landslide.

Engineer Bush succeeded in checking the train upon a trestle near Otter Creek, and went forward in a pouring rain to investigate. The engine had soottened the earth walls of a cut that the whole landslide fell back on the freight was passing, completely burying a large part of the train and overturning both engine and tender.

Engineer Bush hesitated a moment to back his train to Louisville, but had no more than stepped when the landslide had receded so that the engine could pass the track. Volunteers went both ways to telephones, and a working train sent out from Louisville kept a large force busy the rest of the night and well into the morning.

Conductor Biddle led his crew members to the scene, where they were busy for several hours in the day. The engine and tender were damaged, but were later repaired.

There was a landslide of earth and stones escaped from a cave-in which killed several men.

Our news is that the train was wrecked at Otter Creek, near the mouth of Poplar Grove, about 30 miles from Louisville.
